

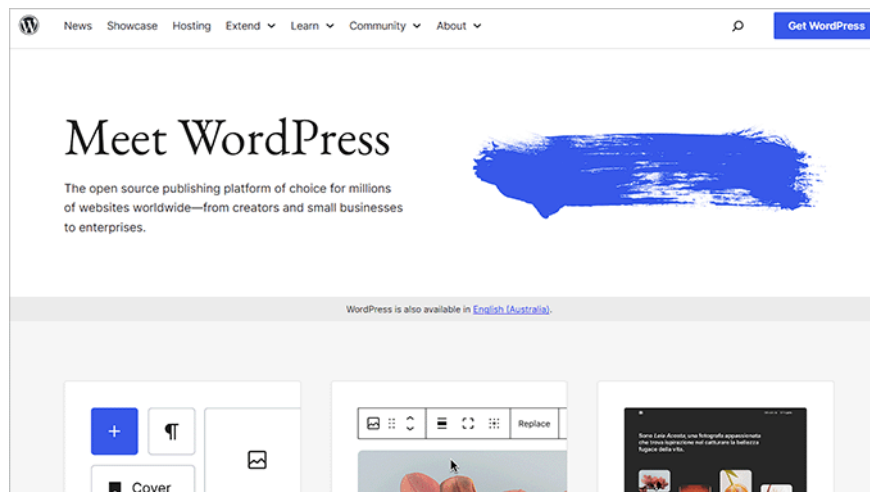

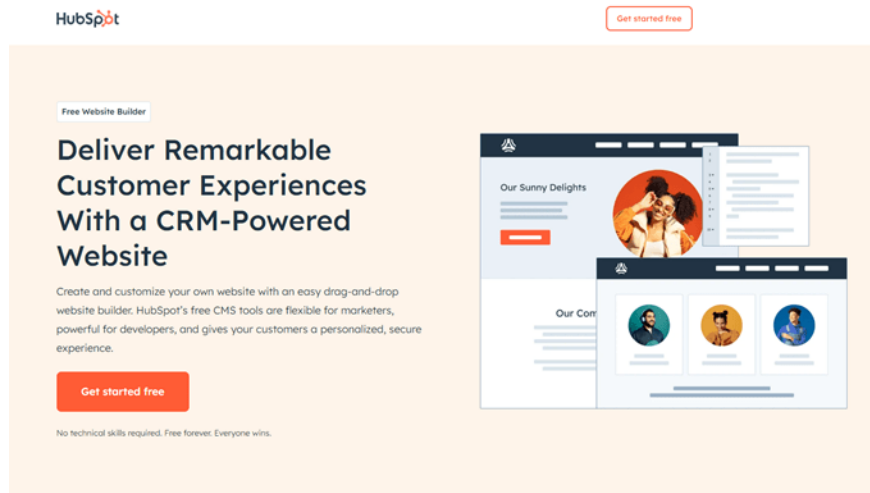
1. WordPress.org

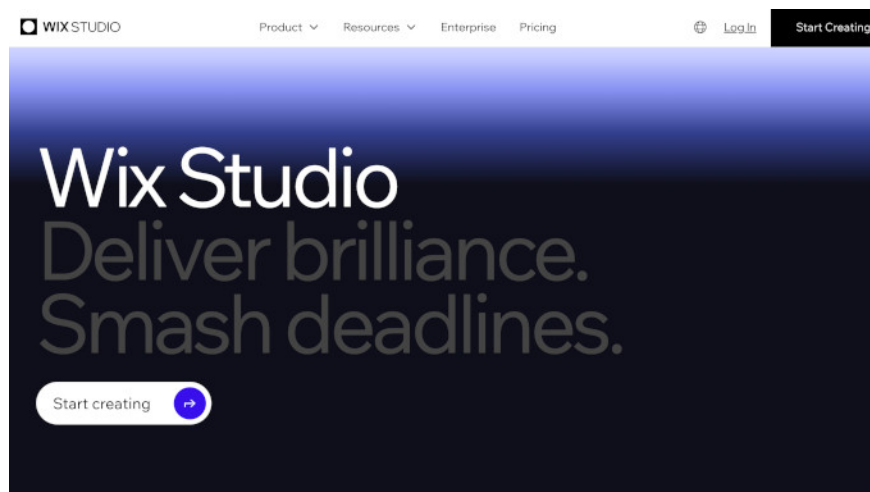
2. HubSpot Content Hub

3. Wix Studio

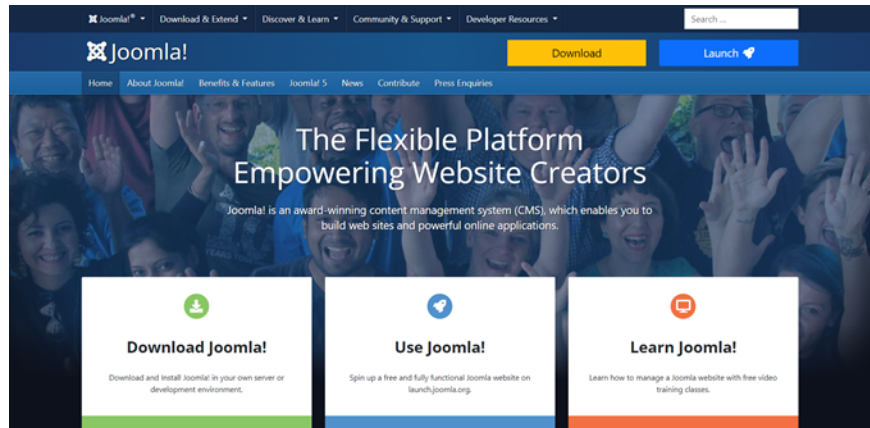

Wix Studio also allows you to use advanced layout settings and connect your website to third-party services using custom code.

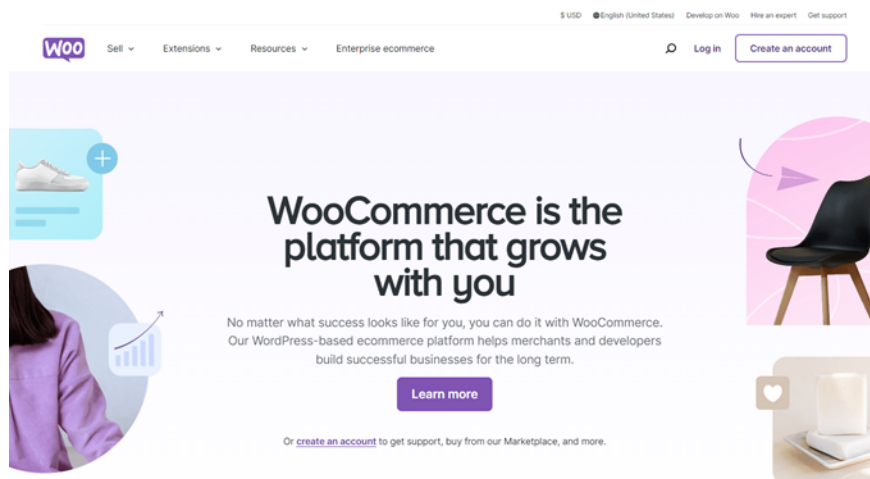
4. Joomla

5. WooCommerce

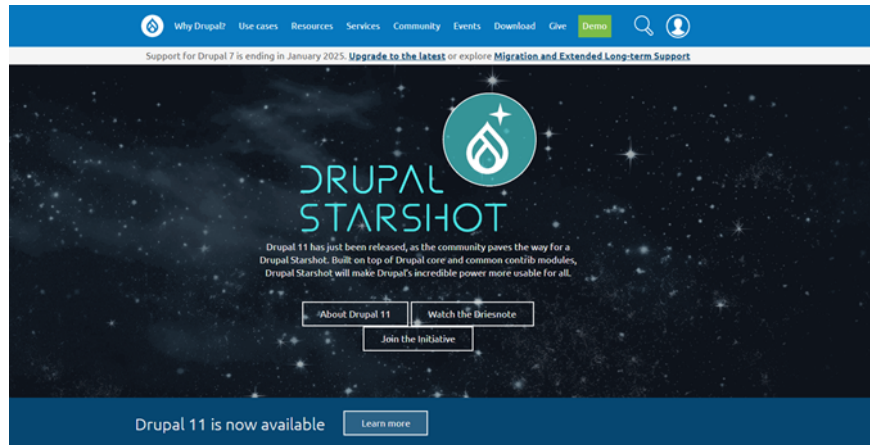


WooCommerce is the world's most popular e-commerce platform. It's truly flexible and easy to manage.

However, like other CMS platforms, many hosting providers also offer WooCommerce hosting, allowing you to quickly launch an online store.

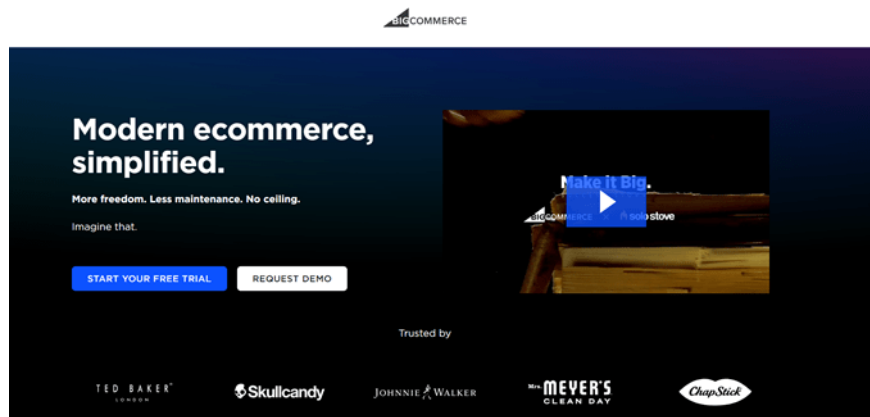
6. Drupal

Drupal can be a good option for developers or those who can hire a developer. It's especially useful if you want to build a highly customized website that needs to handle a lot of data.

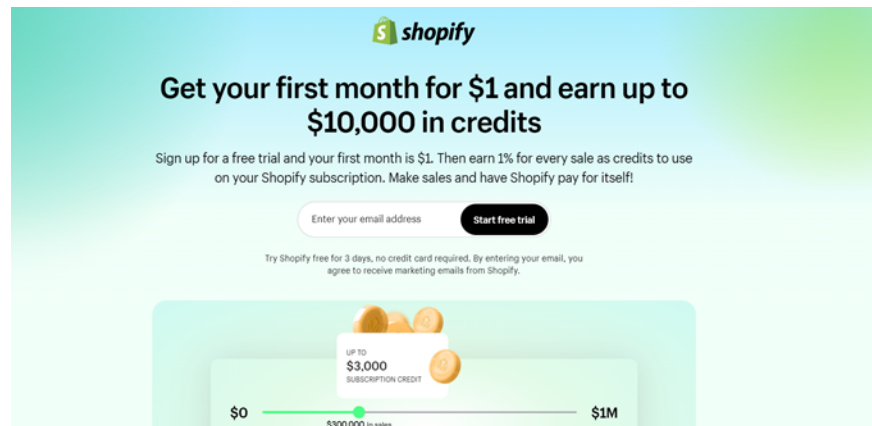
7. BigCommerce

BigCommerce hosts your website and provides the actual CMS platform. This platform also handles security, backups, and caching for you.

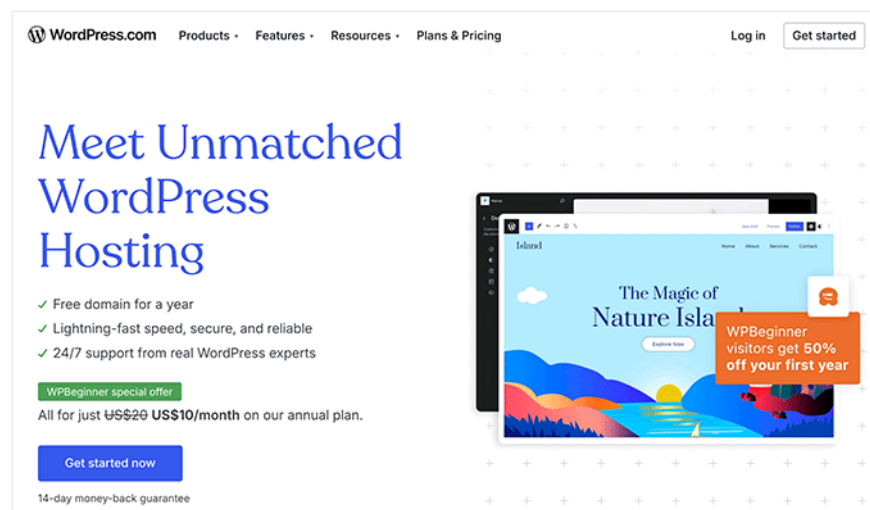
8. Shopify

Shopify has an intuitive drag-and-drop interface. Shopify supports in-store sales, which is great if you have both a physical store and an online store.

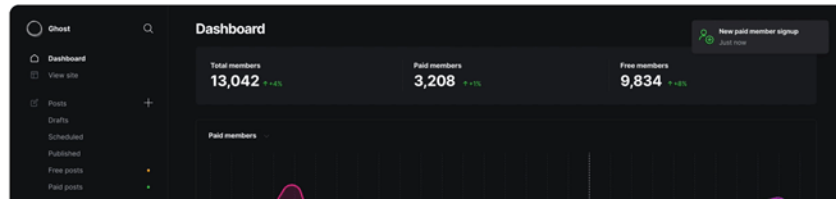
9. WordPress.com

10. Ghost

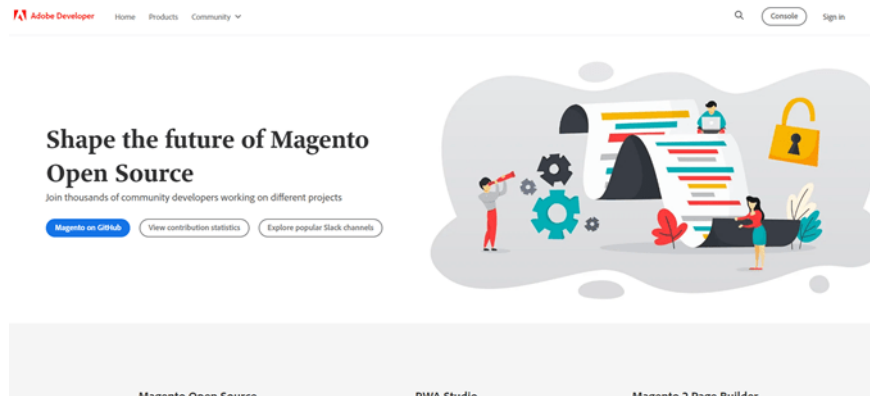
Independent technology for modern publishing.



Ghost is a CMS platform specifically designed for bloggers. You often hear it described as a "headless CMS," which might seem strange. This simply means that this CMS platform doesn't require content to be distributed in a particular way.

Therefore, the content or data you create may be displayed on the website, but it may also be sent to a mobile app or a completely different platform. However, if you are not a developer, or just want to use Ghost for blogging, you don't need to worry about this.

11. Magento



Magento is a powerful open-source e-commerce platform from the software giant Adobe. There is a free version that you can download and install on your web hosting account, called Magento Open Source.

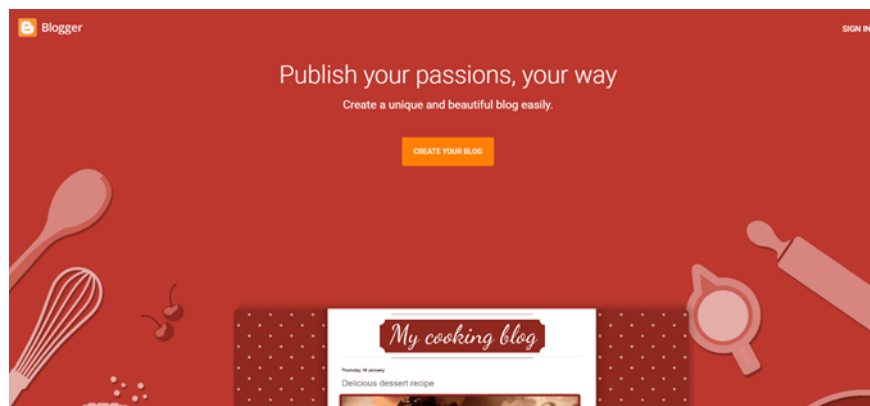
If you want to use this platform, InMotion Hosting's Magento is the easiest way to get started. Alternatively, you can pay for Magento Commerce. This platform comes with full support and is hosted for you, but it's very expensive.

12. Text pattern



Textpattern is a simple, easy-to-use CMS platform that has been around since 2003. It's open source and has plenty of documentation to help you get started.

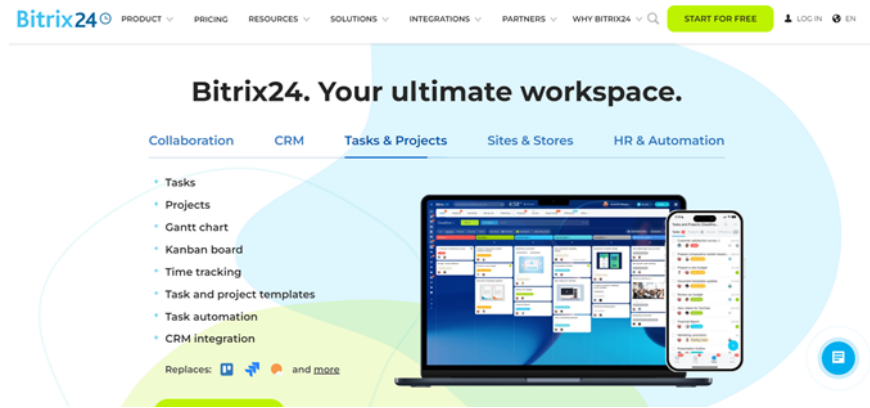
13. Blogger



Blogger was created in 1999. As the name suggests, it's a specialized CMS platform for blogging. It's a free service provided by Google . Blogs on Blogger typically have a blogspot domain, although you can use your own domain name.

Blogger is the best option if you want to monetize your blog without paying a single cent in hosting fees. Unlike Blogger, most free platforms don't allow you to earn money from your website in any way.

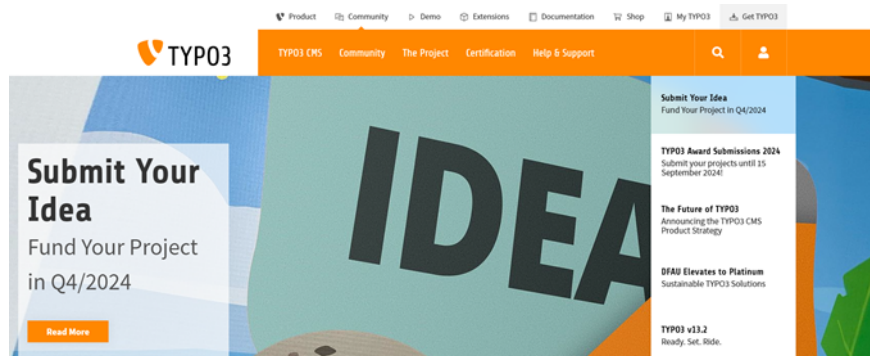
14. Bitrix24



Bitrix24 is a business tool that provides a CMS platform along with other features such as task management, project management, communication, and customer relationship management.

The basic version is free (offering up to 5GB of online hosting and 12 user accounts) and provides an all-in-one solution for small businesses. If you want a CRM (Customer Relationship Management) tool, this could be a good option.

15. TYPO3



TYPO3 is a free, open-source CMS platform that has been around even longer than Blogger. It was first released in 1998. It's a CMS designed for businesses, meaning it's useful for both internal websites (company websites) and general-purpose websites.

There are several extensions available for TYPO3 that offer additional functionality.
