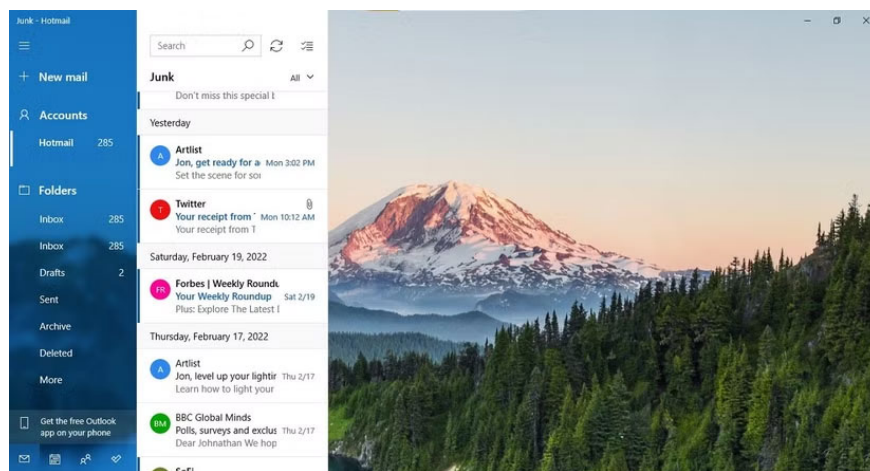

5. Windows Mail and Calendar



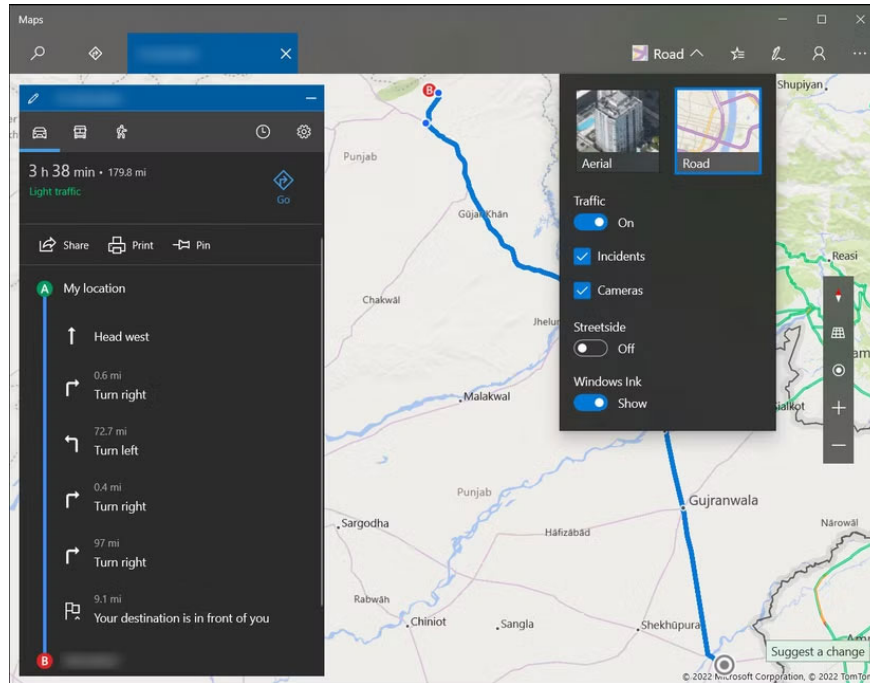

4. Maps



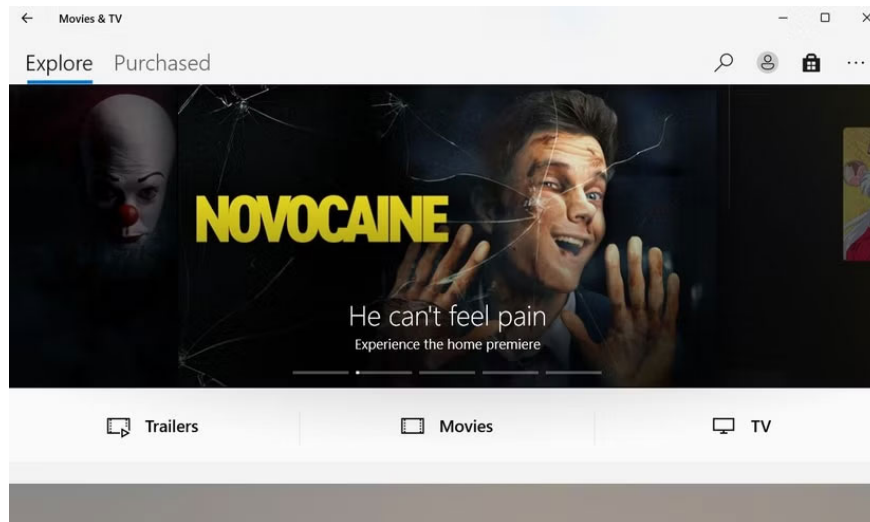
Believe it or not, Microsoft's Maps app has been a part of Windows for over a decade. It's primarily designed for users who want to view maps and get directions directly on their PCs.

However, if you don't need offline access, Windows Maps is just another unnecessary app that takes up space and resources.

3. Movies & TV

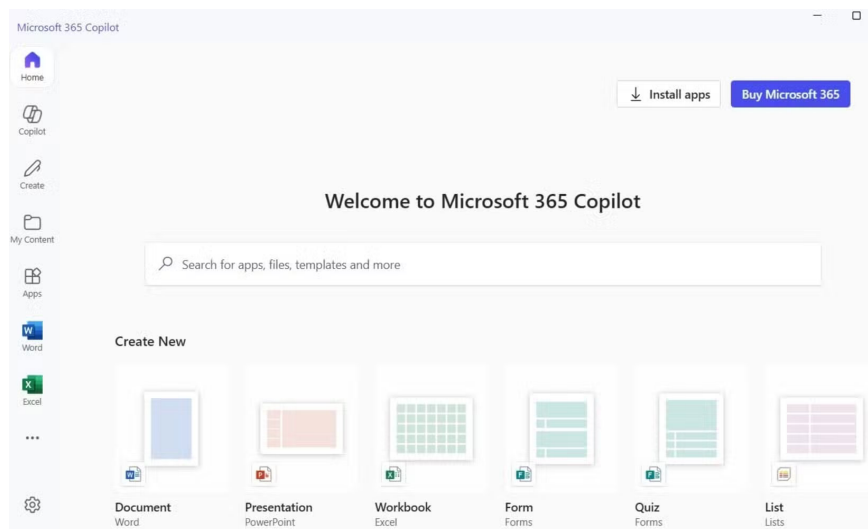

2. Microsoft 365 Copilot



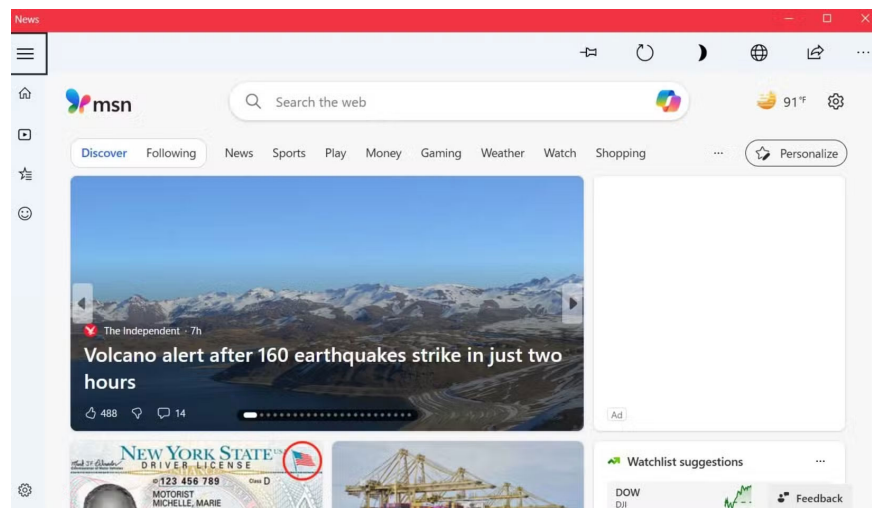
Microsoft has a habit of confusing users with frequent rebranding – the latest example being the move from Office 365 to Microsoft 365 and now the Microsoft 365 Copilot app. While the new name emphasizes integration with Microsoft's AI assistant, Copilot, the app itself may not be necessary for many users.

The Microsoft 365 Copilot application is pre-installed on Windows 11 and serves as a central hub for accessing Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and other Microsoft tools, with integrated AI support. This application promises to streamline productivity by allowing you to create, manage, and share content, provided you are actively using those Office applications and have a Microsoft 365 subscription .

But the problem is: this app doesn't offer many features. For example, when you click on a Word document, the Microsoft Word application opens. Essentially, you'll find yourself switching between multiple applications instead of enjoying a seamless experience.

If you want to view and manage all your Office documents in one place, it's best to use the Microsoft 365 website directly. You can also create a shortcut for this website on your desktop or Start menu.

1. Microsoft News



Microsoft News is an app that provides personalized news stories, similar to Google News Feed on Android phones. While it may be useful for some, the app is already available in other parts of the system.

For example, you can access a nearly identical news feed using the Widgets panel on your PC. This application provides updated content in a clean, efficient layout, eliminating the need to open the Microsoft News app itself.

The default browser on PCs, Microsoft Edge , also includes a customizable news feed on its start page. If you use Edge regularly, you may find that the app provides the same personalized news. Since you can access news in many ways, there's no reason to keep Microsoft News cluttering your system.

Of all the bloatware apps on Windows, this is one of the least useful and almost pointless to keep. Of course, if you change your mind later, you can always reinstall them from the Microsoft Store. However, you probably won't miss them, and your PC will thank you with faster performance and fewer distractions.
