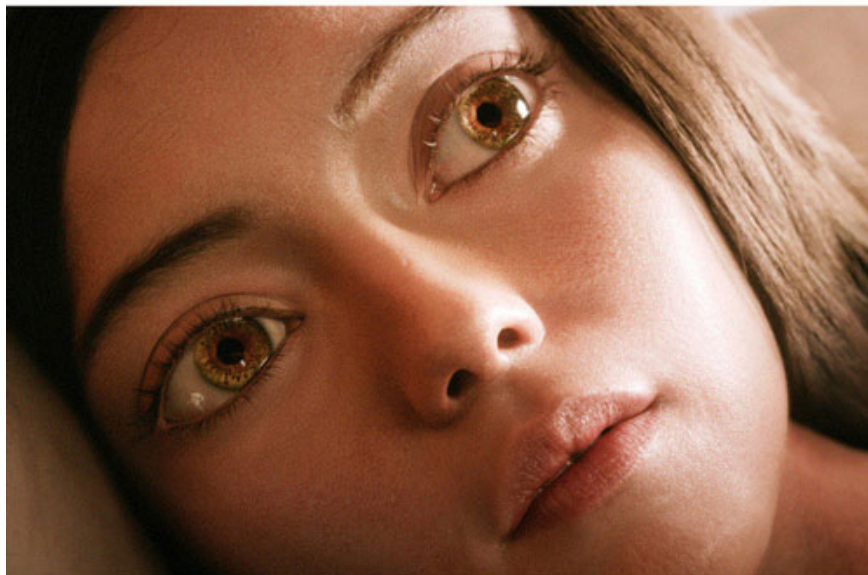


Of course, in these scenes, the accessories and clothes are also not using blue to make post-processing quicker and simpler.

Currently, films in 3D are appearing more and more. But one reality is hard for audiences to recognize, that today's 3D movies offer a much more comfortable experience than before.

In the past, 3D movies were very abusing the effect of objects flying towards the viewer. This causes our brain to react as if it were real and can cause some negative effects such as eye strain, dizziness, headache, and nausea.

To overcome this, the effect experts have accelerated the speed of flying objects or 3D effects with small objects (sand, dust, snow) so that the brain does not focus on it.

3. Children in horror movies often do not know what they are doing

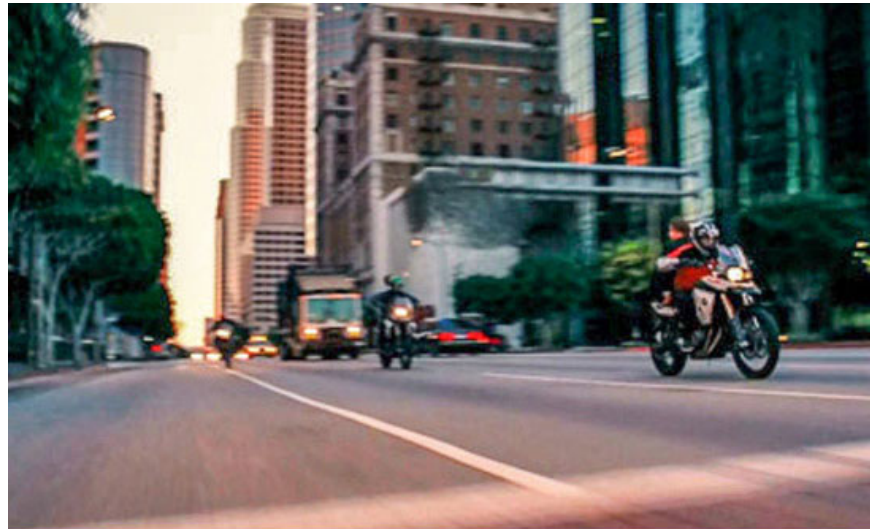
5. A mirror shot is the hardest

Mirror scenes are always the most difficult, because they have to be carefully calculated so that the mirror only reflects the actors, and the camera and the light do not.

6. The intentional "grain"

Many movies - including blockbusters - have "grit" and directors sometimes know that, even if they intentionally leave it behind.

For example, in *The Dark Knight Rises* of the Batman series, there was a picture of Batman walking into the tunnel during the daytime, but it was dark when he got out of the other side. Director Christopher Nolan knows this 'hotel' well and he 'ignored' it because obviously the guy Batman looks more impressive and "better" when appearing at night.

7. There is a company specializing in snow making for Hollywood



Snow Business, a company founded in 1983 that provides artificial snow for most Hollywood movies. This company has the ability to create 200 different types of snow.

8. Mass actors must never look at the camera



There are very strict requirements about the public actors, they must not look directly into the lens to create a natural feeling and not wear clothes that are too prominent because it will distract the audience from the main character in scene.

9. The food in the movie is rarely genuine



The food didn't last long, and the movie couldn't be finished in just one day. Therefore, the majority of food that appears in scenes is not edible.

For example, in the party scene in Harry Potter, real food is only used in the first part of the movie, from part 2, most dishes are made from rosin.
