1. Vimeo.com



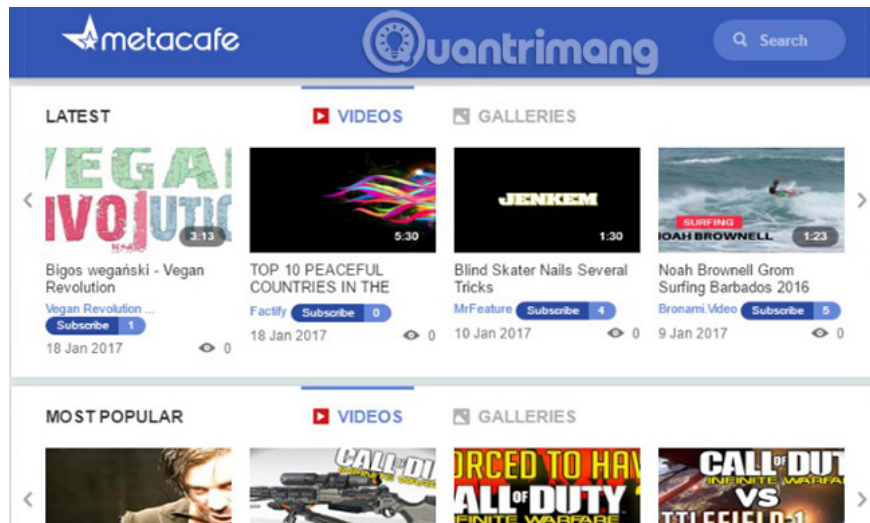
Even if you visit YouTube on a regular basis, you should also use Vimeo. This site is the first page on the web that supports high-definition video, and although the app includes a number of bundled fees, high-quality content is still a 'score' in the user's eyes.

The site also has a search feature that helps streamline videos by category and channel. If you are not sure what you want to see? Content that is regularly updated on Vimeo can help you.

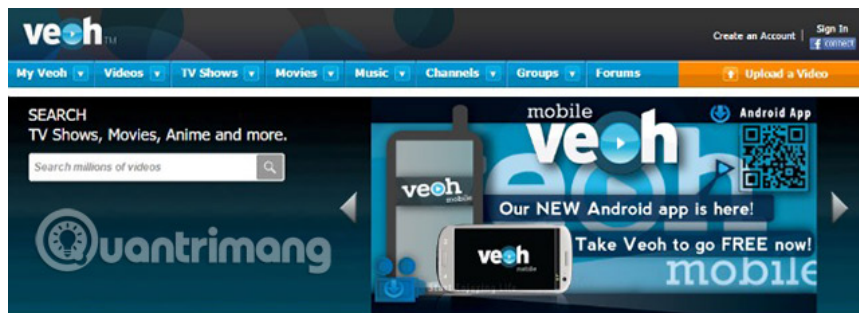
2. Metacafe.com



Metacafe is a video site that specializes in shortform video content (short video). This includes everything, from words that stand out around the world, quick reviews of products, to tips to get past the hard level of your favorite video game.

One of Metacafe's strengths is its simplicity. The web browsing interface of this application is quite simple, with the menu bar linked to **'latest'** videos, **'popular'** (**'popular'**) and **'trending'** (prevalent). Those who want to dig deeper can click on the drop-down menu. Including the list expanded over 16 video categories.

3. Archive.org

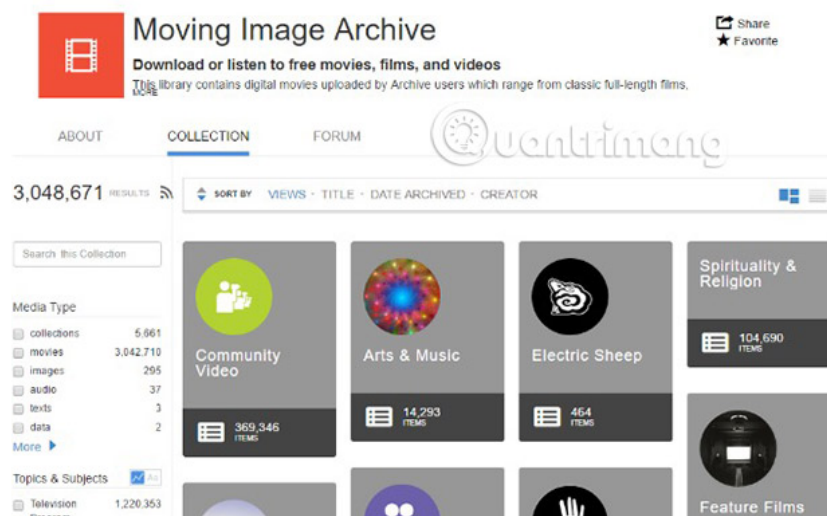


As its name suggests, the Internet Archive is a web-based library, containing all kinds of free content, including books, music, software and, of course, movies.

Just like you can combine a physical library with research, one of the strengths of video content on The Internet Archive is a very wide range. Although The Internet Archive also has some new content, some of its best videos are news reports, old and obscure dramas, or movies that are often hard to find on websites. other.

Like many other websites, users can upload videos to The Internet Archive. When uploading videos to this page, H.264 is the popular video encoding format used.

4. Crackle.com

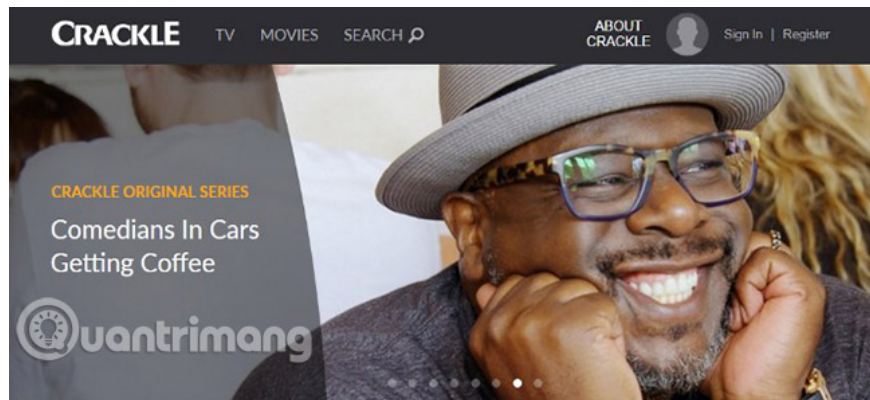


Owned by Sony Pictures Entertainment, consider Crackle as an online TV channel, which also includes original web programming, as well as Hollywood movies and TV shows from various networks.

Some of Crackle's original content gained significant approval, including the Comedians in Cars Getting Coffee series with Jerry Seinfeld. It also has a variety of television programs that receive positive feedback from viewers, such as All in the Family, 227, Firefly, Mad About You, and News Radio.

In addition, this site is a good place to find old movies you missed, such as Night of the Living Dead, Animal House, Paranormal Activity, and Rudy.

5. Screenjunkies.com



While many of the options on this list have a variety of television programs or movies, Screen Junkies specializes in original content. Most programs of this site are funny. For example, in Honest Trailers, comedians voiced their own preview version of Screen Junkies for various television and movie programs.

Another cool program available on Screen Junkies is TV Fights, in which people claiming to be "TV nerds" (moviewriters) will debate various topics, such as 'What was the worst sitcom of the '90s?' (What is the worst Sitcom of the 90s?).

Visitors can watch some Screen Junkies videos for free. Premium subscription is \$ 4.99 / month (116,000 VND) or 15-month prepaid price is \$ 59 (1,375,000 VND).

6. MySpace.com

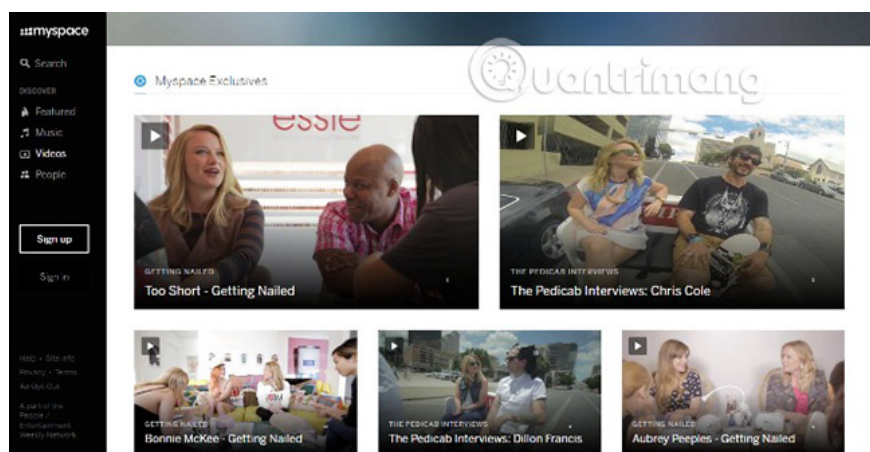


Many of us may only know MySpace is a social networking site in the mid-2000s, the predecessor of modern Facebook. Up to now, this website still exists, and it is currently more focused on videos.

Many videos on MySpace are interview videos, introducing celebrities in special situations. For example, in the Get Nailed series, many celebrities were interviewed during nail salon work.

There are many other similar thematic video interviews on the web, many of which involve artists in the music industry or action sports stars, for example, The Pedicab Interviews: Dillon Francis, The Chairlift Interviews: Shaun Francis, and OK Go: The Ferris Wheel Interviews.

7. Open-video.org

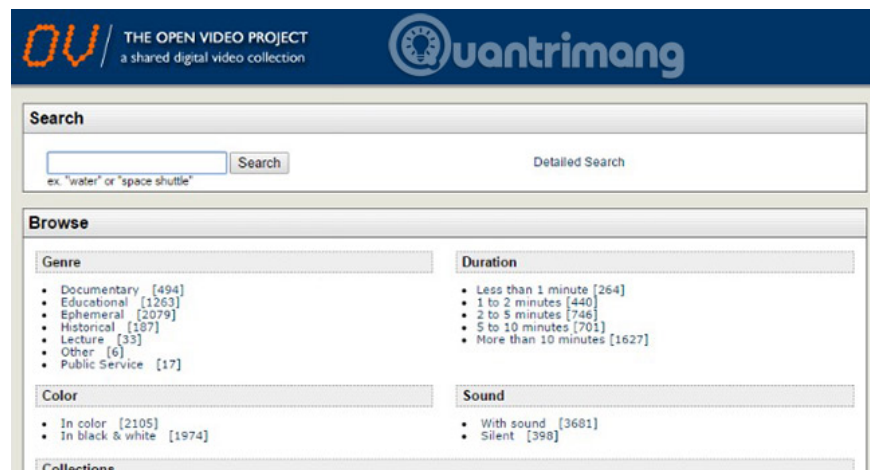


The Open Video Project has been developed at an interactive design lab at Chapel Hill Library of Information and Science in North Carolina. The site is targeted to the research community, including those working with digital libraries and multimedia retrieval.

With that in mind, most of the videos found on The Open Video Project are educational. There are many videos from NASA archives, as well as a collection of classic television ads and educational films that have appeared

since the 1950s. If you are looking for and researching historical video content Please try to refer to The Open Video Project.

8. 9GAG



Think of 9GAG as a collection of all the fun and goofy: Funny pictures, GIFs, video games, meme (an online trend), anime, and something like that. It is true to the site's criteria: "Be happy".

Most of the content on this page is quite interesting. Video titles include things like "A Compilation of the Best Commercial Starred by the Star Wars Crew" or "This High School Love Story Will Warm Your Heart and Then Break It Before You Know What Happened".

That's the kind of content that no one can hardly click on and then spend hours watching these content. Before you visit, be alert: The website contains some videos with risky content and should not be tried at home.
