

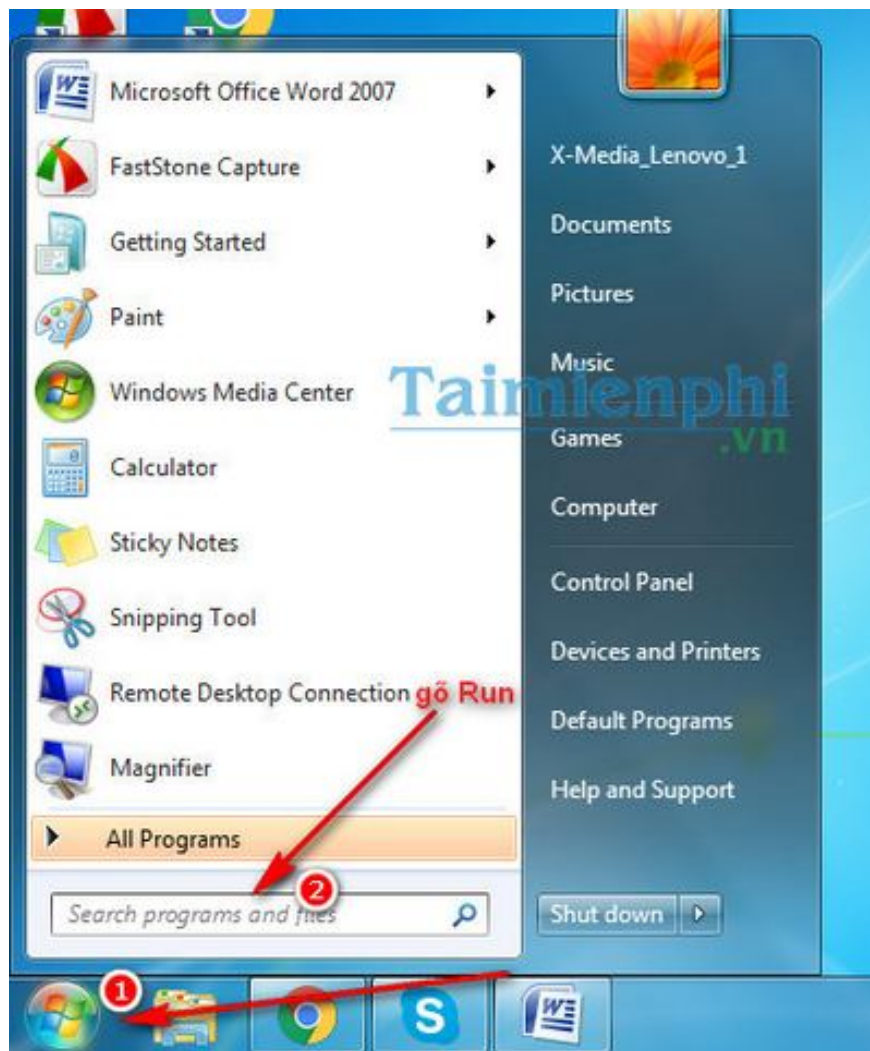
Add Run Command to the Taskbar on Windows 7/8/10

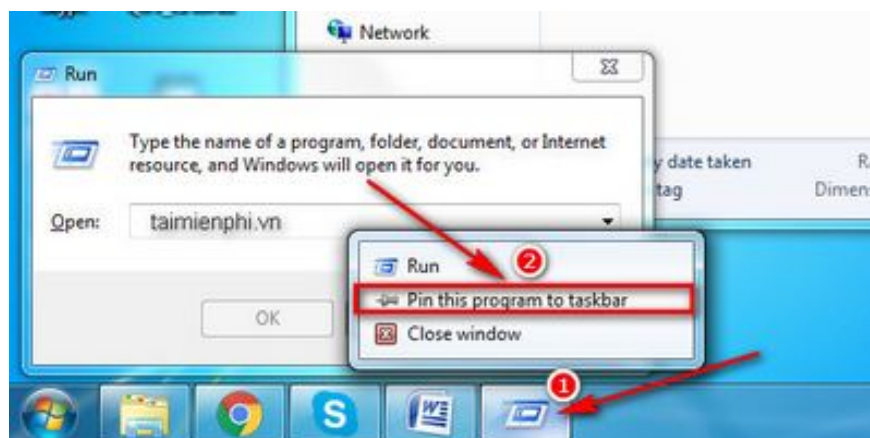
