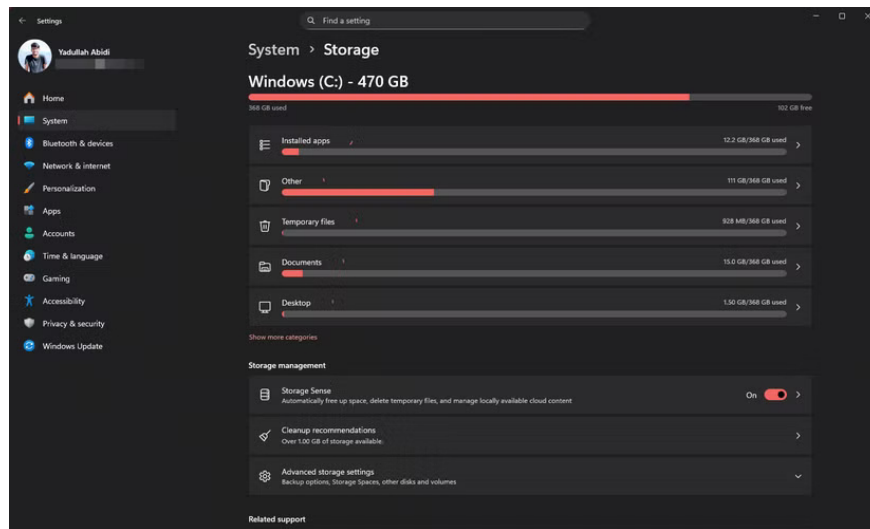

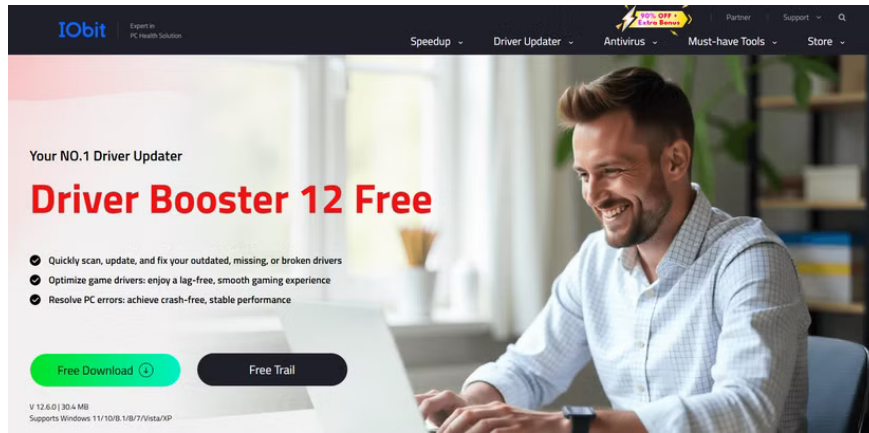
5. File compression tool

4. Driver update tool

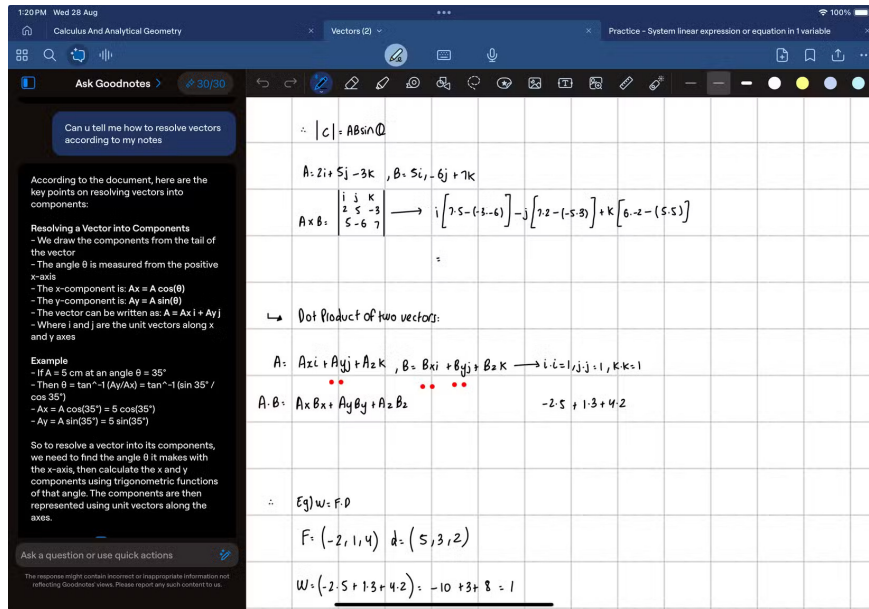
It's important to keep your core drivers up to date, but driver update tools aren't the best way to do it. They're notorious for downloading the wrong drivers, installing them incorrectly, or creating similar problems that are worse than having outdated drivers.



Instead, let Windows Update install basic driver updates, use AMD software, update your GPU, and run the motherboard utility for core system drivers. No need to pay and less risk of something going wrong.

3. Note taking application

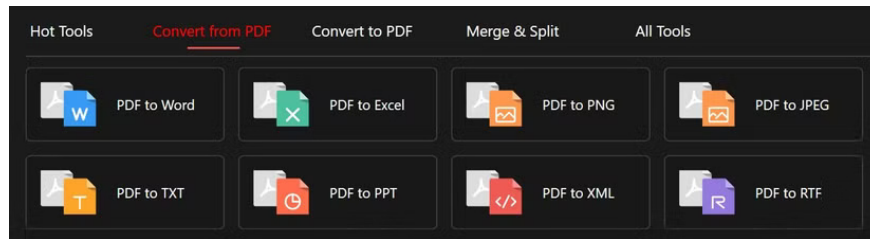
Paid note-taking tools have some value to some people, but others feel the need to use them.

2. PDF Tools

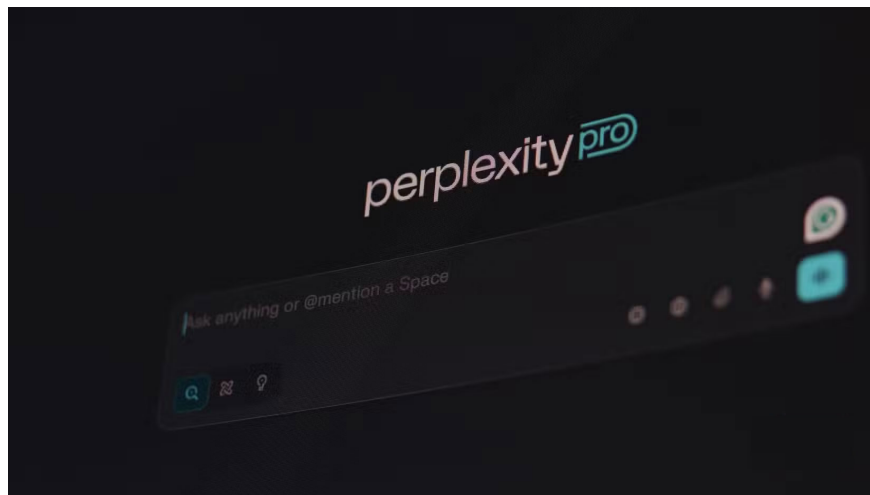
The paid version of Nitro PDF is useful for heavy PDF editing. But many have also realized there are free tools to handle any editing you need.
