

## Explore the mysterious world of Tasmanian devils, the world's largest pocketed 'killer'

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In 1936, after the extinction of the Tasmanian wolf, the Tasmanian demon became the world's largest carnivore. They mainly live in Tasmania Island, Australia.



Tasmanian devils are very aggressive animals, they are ready to eat any animal they hunt. Even kidneys, they also eat scavengers and bones.



Their external appearance makes anyone new to see also have "hair on the back of the neck". A striking white streak on the black fur blinks very mysteriously. The head is very similar to mice but they have the teeth of wolves.



Long teeth with extremely strong jaws, they can kill prey at a glance with fatal bites. Along with that, they constantly emit creepy screams that make locals and discoveries of nature inevitable.



Tasmanian devils often live and hunt alone. In the breeding season, they only meet to mate but the time only lasts about 5 days.



The gestation period of Tasmanian Devil is quite short, only lasts about 21 days. Each female usually lays between 1 and 4 children. At birth, the baby Tasmanian demon weighs only 0.18-0.24 grams and is about 0.2cm long.



When you were born, the Tasmanian demon will crawl into your mother's pocket. After 3 months there, its body is complete and can go out to explore nature. When reaching the age of 3.5 - 4 months, young babies begin to wean their mothers.



As an adult, the Tasmanian devil is about the size of a small dog with an average weight of 8kg and 57-65cm long.



In 2008, the number of Tasmanian devils living in the wild is only about 10,000 - 15,000, down more than 80% compared to 1990. The cause is due to epidemics and hunting by local people.



Currently, Tasmanian devils have been included in the list of endangered animals and protected by the Australian Biodiversity Conservation Act, prohibiting hunting in any form. But their numbers still grow very slowly.

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
