## Utilize the Power of HDR Mode

High Dynamic Range (HDR) mode is a nifty setting for scenes with varying light levels. The result is a photo with a greater range of tones and details. Be cautious, though—overusing HDR can lead to overly processed and artificial-looking photos. It's best for situations with a high contrast between light and dark areas.
