The photograph of Marilyn Monroe and the white dress blown by the wind to reveal her legs was taken from the movie 'The Seven Year Itch' which caught the attention of the public. To get this classic picture, Marilyn Monroe had to act again and again in front of the camera. When making these scenes, Joe DiMaggio, her jealous husband, was also at the set and was furious when she saw her wife reveal a part of her body.

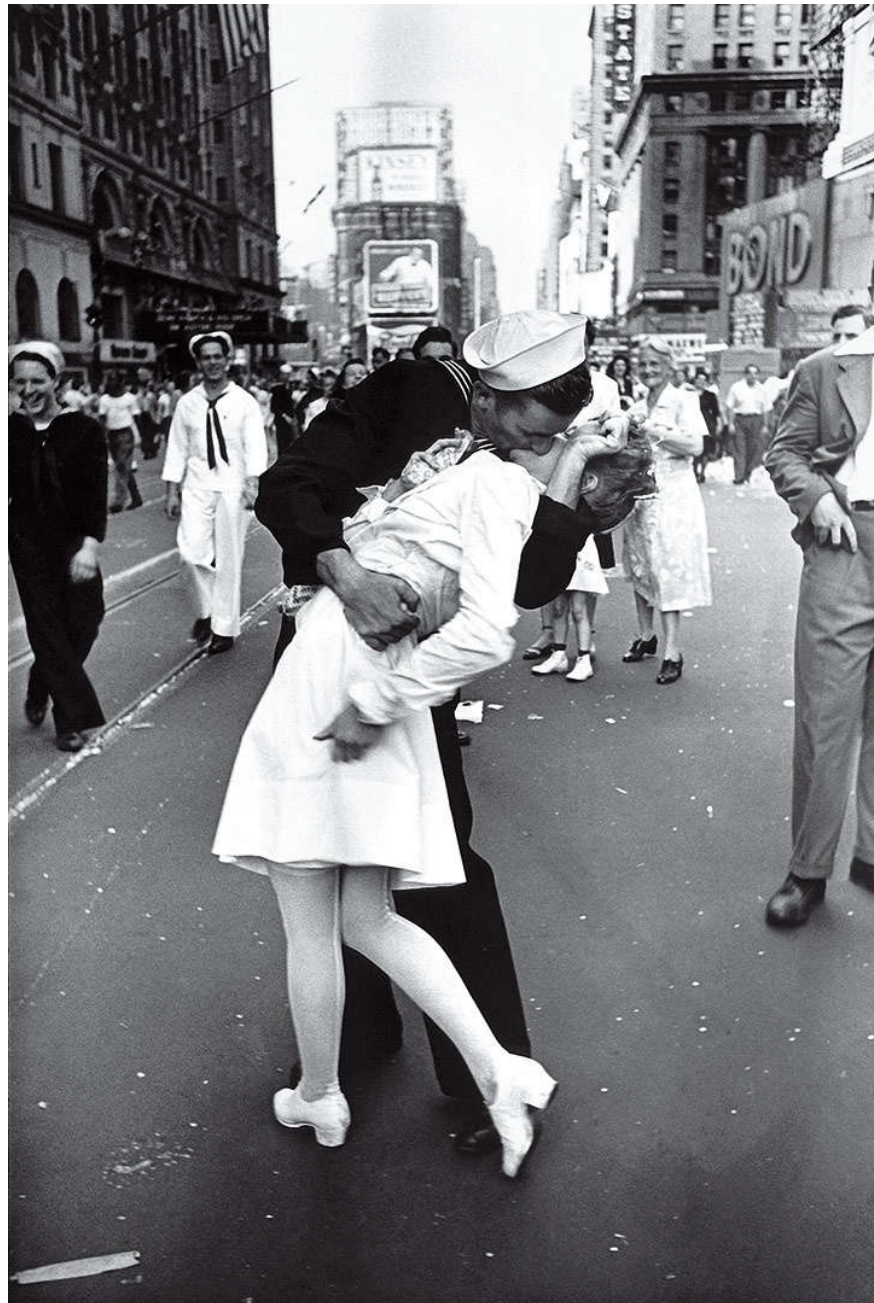


Looking at this picture, many people will assume that it is a work of Photoshop technology rather than a photograph taken in 1948. Salvador Dalí, a famous painter with surreal style came up with the idea. This creativity and the support of photographer Philippe Halsman, a good friend of his. Drawings and easel are hung on the ceiling with a rope, the chair is held by an assistant, Dalí jumps, the cat jumps, the water splashes and wipes back. That process repeats up to 28 times before capturing this great picture.



In the 1980s, an American photographer, Steve McCurry, ventured to Afghanistan to gather documents about the war. In 1984, in a refugee camp in northwest Pakistan, the eyes and expressions of a 12-year-old girl when her village was burned and many members of her family were killed were caught in the lens of he.

The image of "Afghan Girl" helped McCurry win many prestigious photography awards. It was not until 2002, the identity of the girl in the photo was identified as Sharbat Gula.



The kiss on Times Square is one of the most famous photos of the 20th century. The picture is a moment when a sailor and nurse are kissing between Times Square in the context of people celebrating the day. end of World War II. Interestingly, the two main characters in the photo had absolutely no knowledge of each other before.

The girl in the picture is Edith Shain, a nurse. When she was rushing to Times Square, a sailor suddenly grabbed and gave her a kiss. Photographer Alfred Eisenstaedt captured this moment and uploaded it in Life magazine.

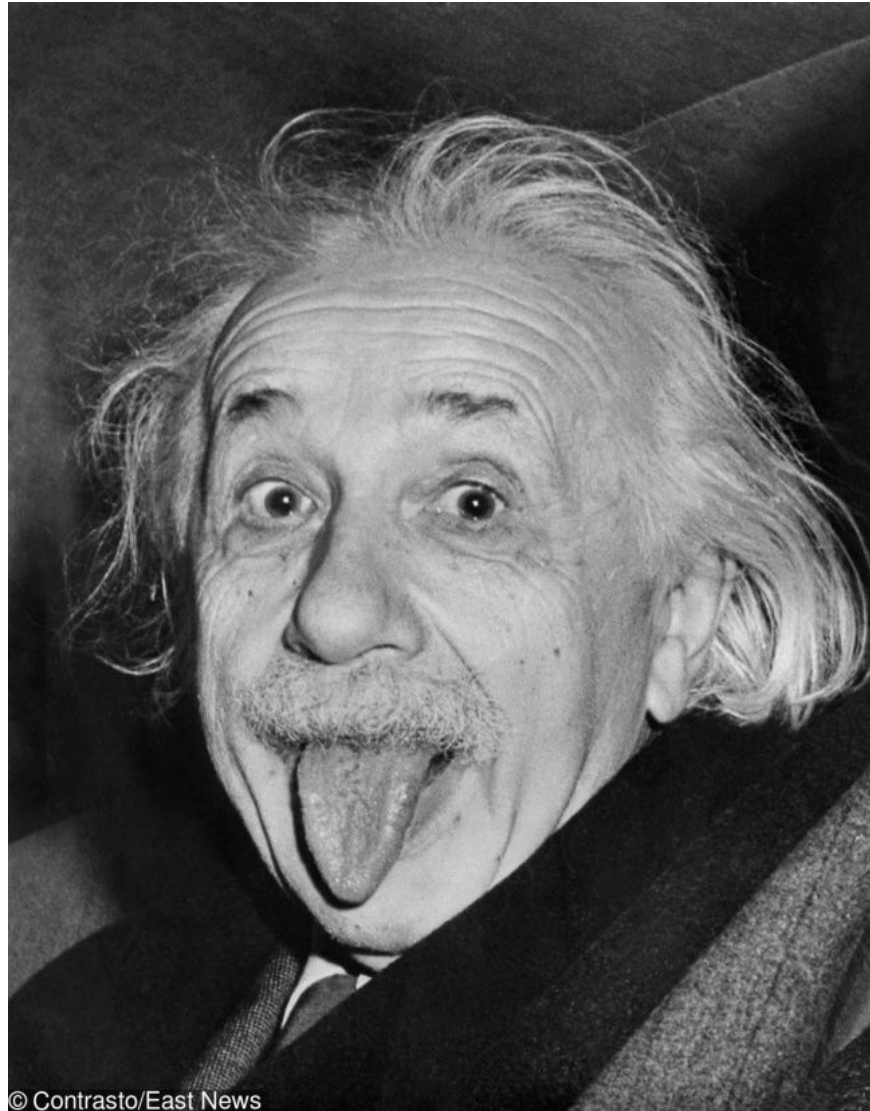


The Beatles band only takes about 15 minutes to take cover photos for their 12th album 'Abbey Road' at the road right next to the studio. Traffic modes had to temporarily stop traffic when the band performed this event. In response to the offer, Einstein turned around and stuck out his tongue, Sasse caught the moment. At first, the photo was larger in size, but later cut into a portrait. Einstein really liked this picture, he put it in all his greeting cards.

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
