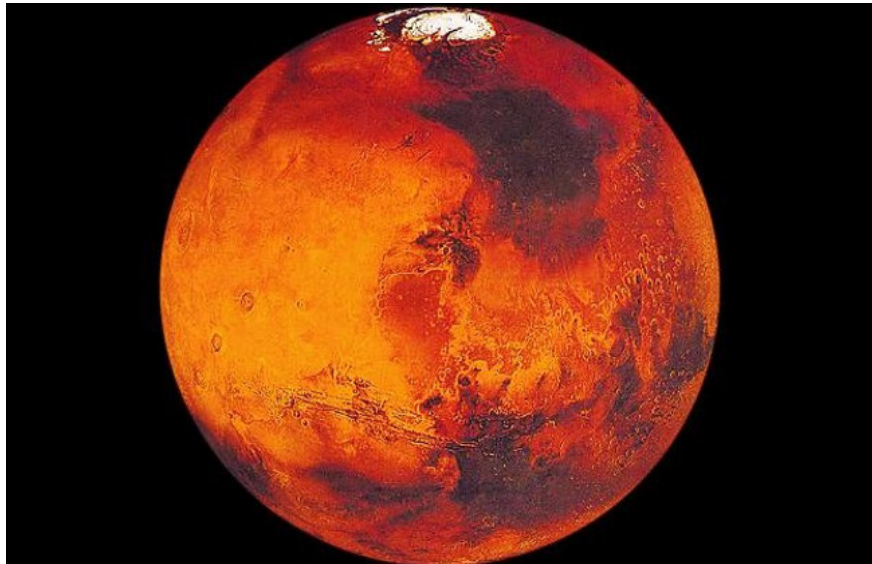


Interesting scientific facts surprise you
