Identify and Empower Your Stakeholders

Get the Business Requirements Covered

On the requirements side, you also need to ensure that the required annual filings of your organization have been made. Your state and the IRS will require annual filings to respectively maintain your organization's good standing and tax exemption. Make sure to stay updated on any changes in the requirements or if there are additional requirements your organization has to comply with, especially during the formation of your organization or when there are changes in your mission.

IRS 990 forms also need to be reviewed regularly, especially if your NPO has been established for a long time. Check the accuracy of the information stated in your Form 990, 990-PF, or 990-EZ, as this is the only public source of information of your organization's program and financial information.

Compliance with state boundary requirements should also be maintained. You may find your organization supporting or serving constituents or soliciting beyond your state's borders. These situations are bound to happen given the extent of the reach of social media, email, and crowdfunding. You have to be prepared to handle additional agency filings for these 'cross-state services.' These filings will also be crucial to your out-of-state contribution solicitations in the future.

Know the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws

It is essential to revisit the articles of incorporation and bylaws that you or those who preceded you have created and filed during the launching of your NPO. These documents should be reviewed from time to time to make sure that your NPO's operations and activities still align with these documents. One vital piece of information to check is the accurate number of Board of Directors positions elected and filled. This information should match what is declared in the IRS 990 forms to keep your organization's relevant documents updated.

Plan Outcome Measurements and Practice Risk management

The success of your NPO depends on how effectively you measure results, collect data, analyze program outcomes, test alternatives, and push to drive improvements. Formulating an outcome measurement strategy helps prevent the stagnation of your organization's programs and enables their continuous measurement, assessment, and improvement. Early planning of and involvement of stakeholders at the definition and inception of the program helps save time in implementing and completing the program. The more heads are involved in setting the program goals, the more efficient the program becomes, and it is easier to measure and assess.

Risk management is another vital factor to consider when conceptualizing, planning, and implementing your organization's projects. As a manager or leader of your NPO, you have to wear different hats in the process, including the black hat and green, in which you identify the possible risks and solutions of your project, respectively. It is wise to have a backup plan for the uncertainties and contingency plans for possible worst-case scenarios to ensure the continuity of the project and its success.
