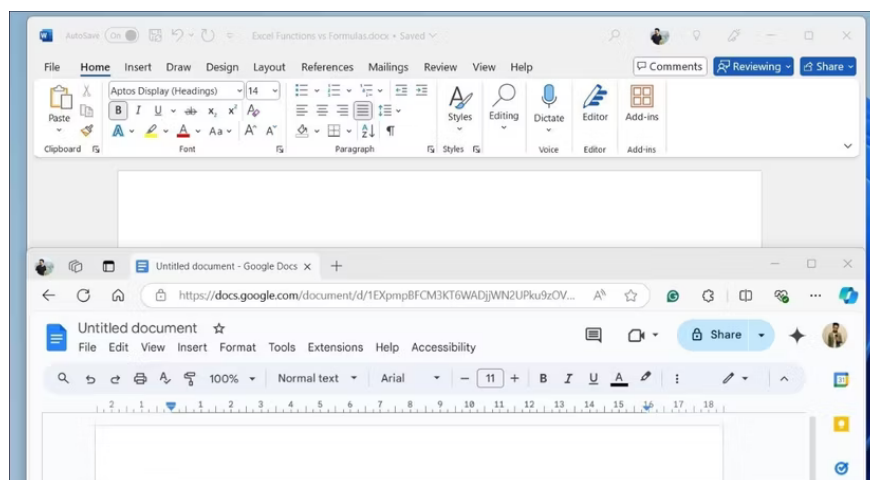
1. Features

2. User Interface and Ease of Use

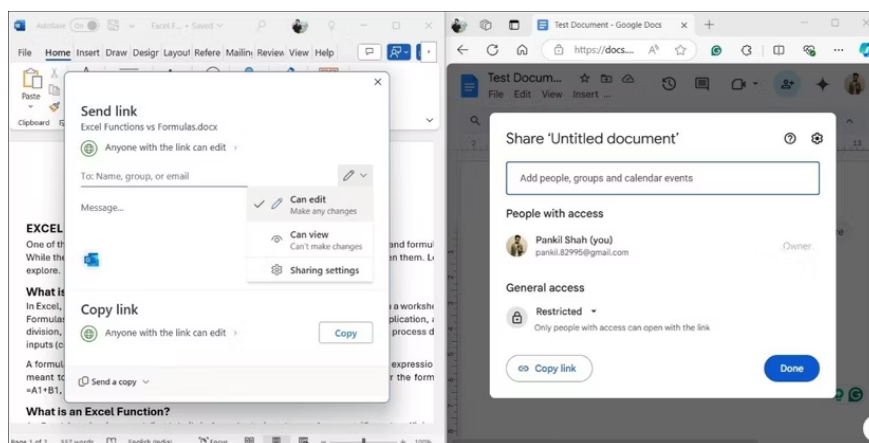

3. File sharing and collaboration

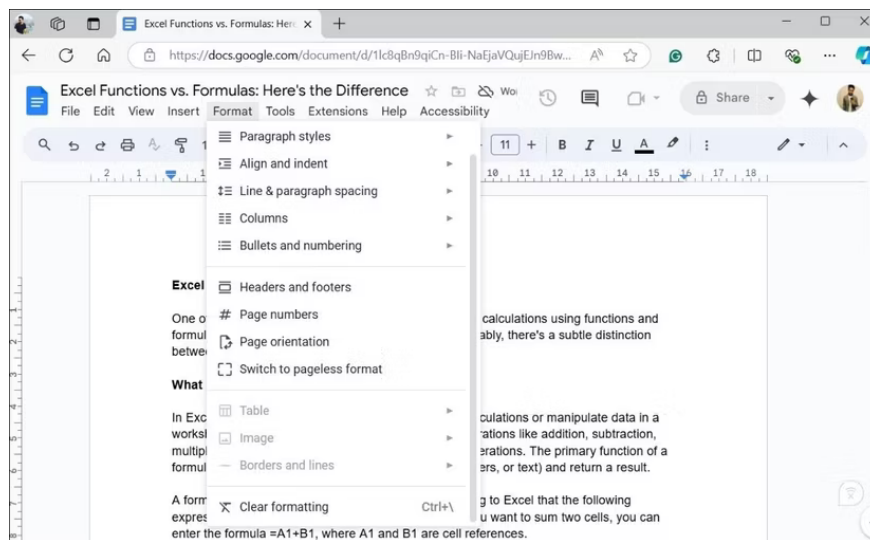

4. Offline access

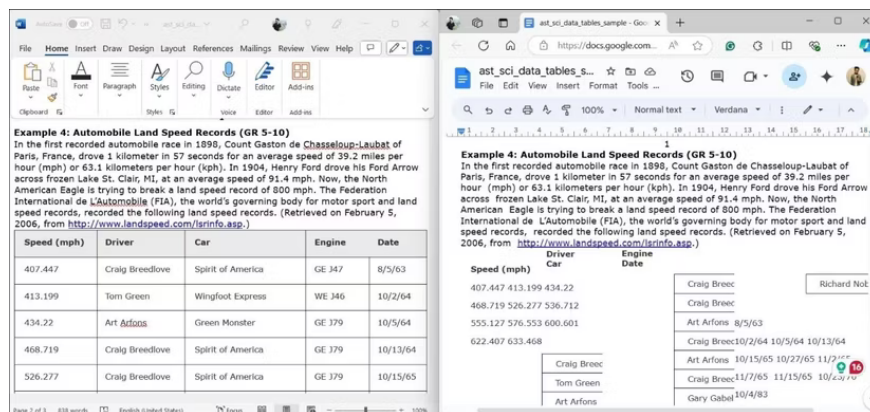

5. File compatibility



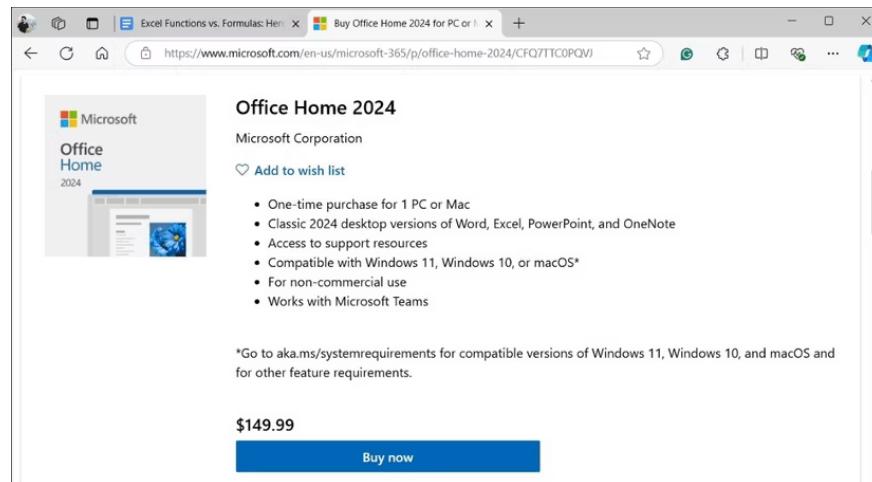
