

Organisms with the largest 'population' on Earth

Ants, Birds, Reptiles,... are animals considered to have the largest 'population' on Earth.

1. Ants



Ants are one of the largest animals on Earth today. According to estimates by a team of experts led by biologist Mark Wong, there are about 10 trillion ants in the world. Their total biomass is up to 12 million tons, accounting for 20% of human biomass. Ants play an important role in the ecosystem, moving soil, distributing seeds and recycling organic matter.

2. Birds



According to research by the University of New South Wales, on Earth there are about 50 billion individual birds divided into 9,700 species. Among these, there are 4 bird species with more than 1 billion individuals.

3. Reptiles



Modern reptiles include lizards, snakes, turtles, and crocodiles, and are estimated to number about 10 quadrillion individuals.

4. Mosquitoes



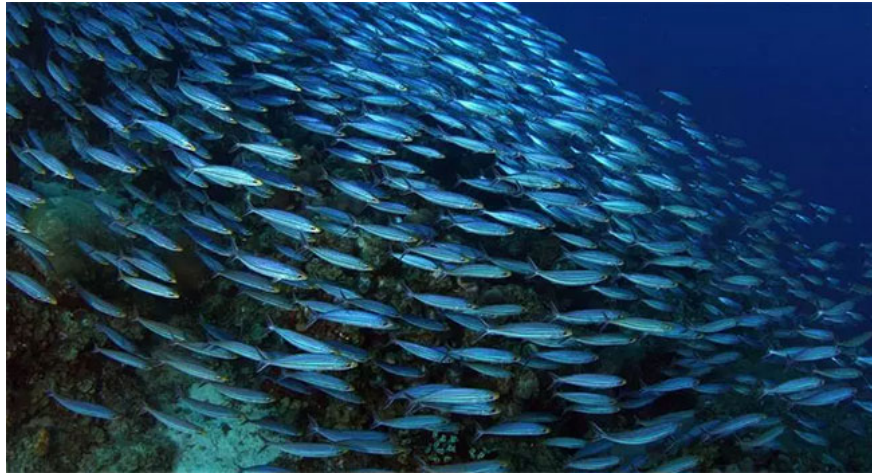
Mosquitoes, belonging to the class of insects, grow mainly in stagnant and tropical waters. There are an estimated 1 quadrillion individuals globally.

5. Mollusks



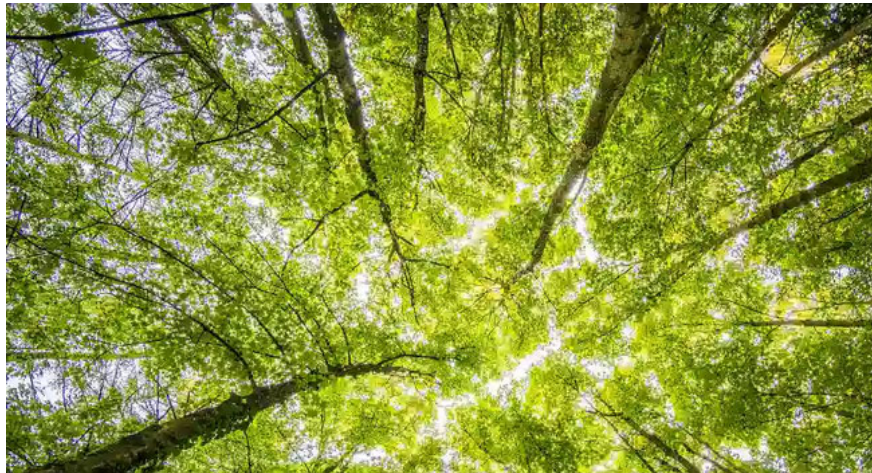
The Molluscan phylum includes clams, oysters, snails, mussels, clams, squid, and octopus. This is the largest group of marine animals, with about 500 trillion individuals.

6. Fish



Fish live in most large bodies of water, at depths ranging from saltwater to freshwater. An estimated 3.5 trillion individual fish, divided into about 33,600 species, have been recorded.

7. Tree



The Earth currently has 3.04 trillion trees, a 46% decrease compared to the time humans appeared.

8. Chicken



With 24 billion individuals, chickens are the most numerous bird species. The chicken industry has grown dramatically since the 1940s, accounting for 23 billion of the 30 billion animals raised on farms.

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
