

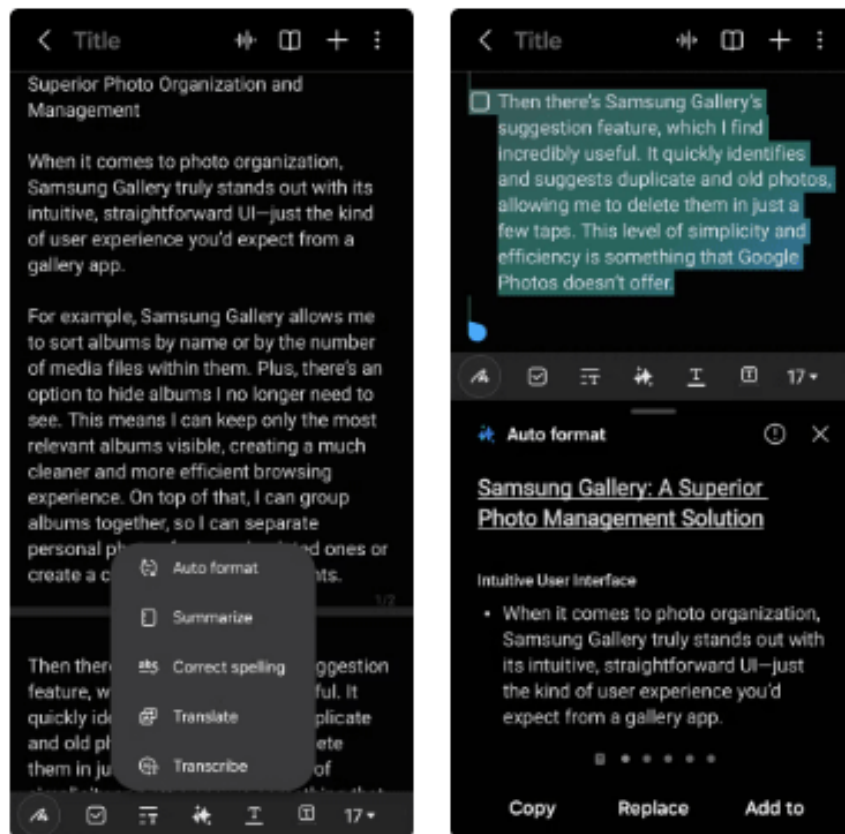

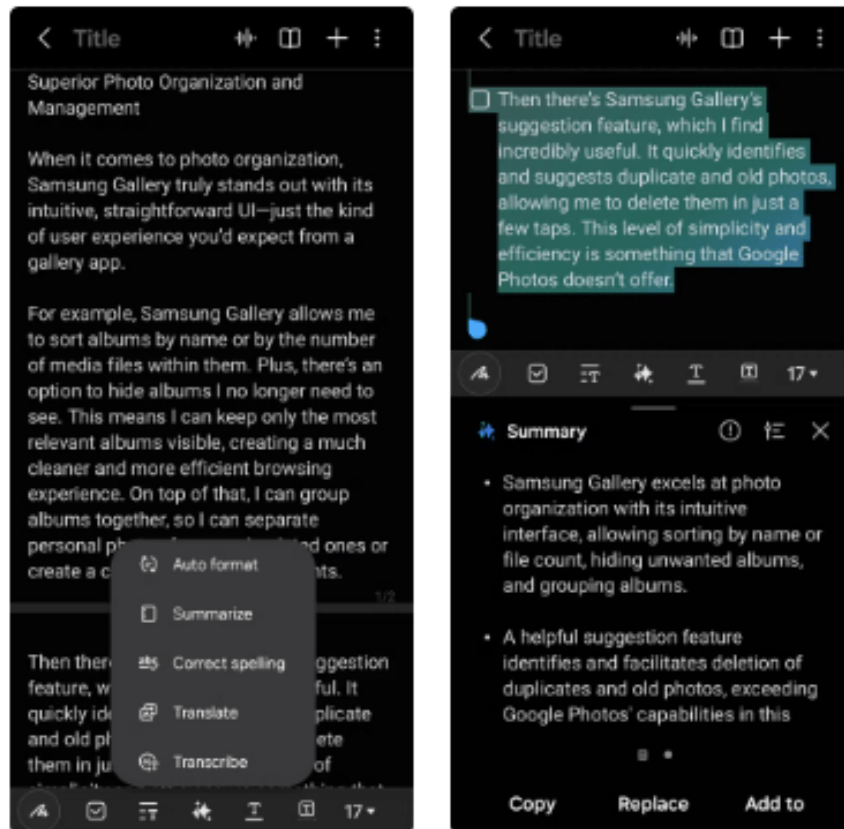

2. Summary notes

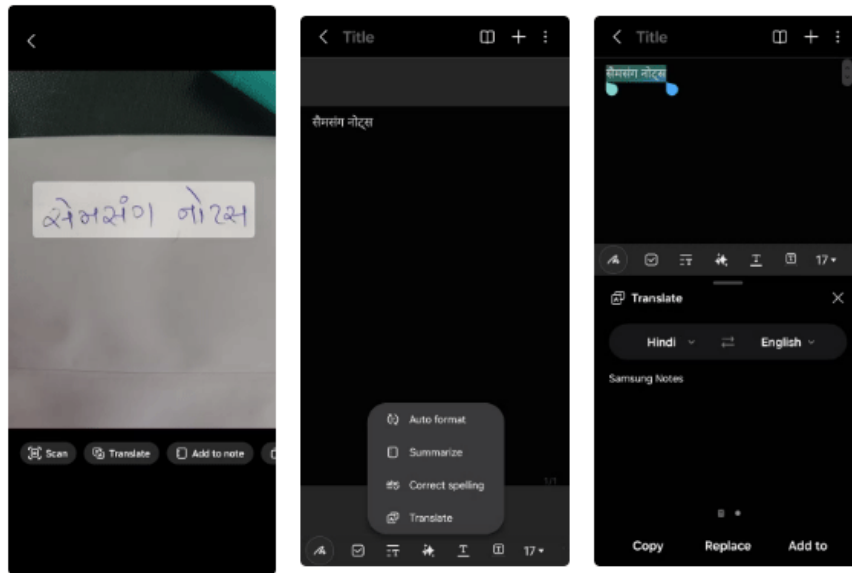

3. Easy translation

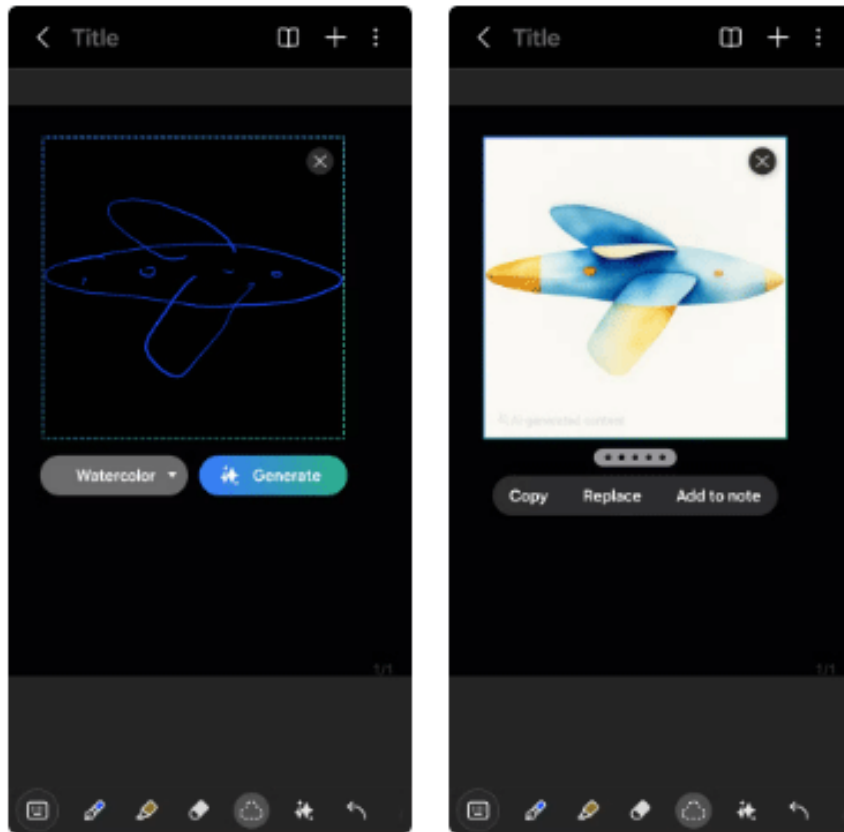

4. Drawing assistant

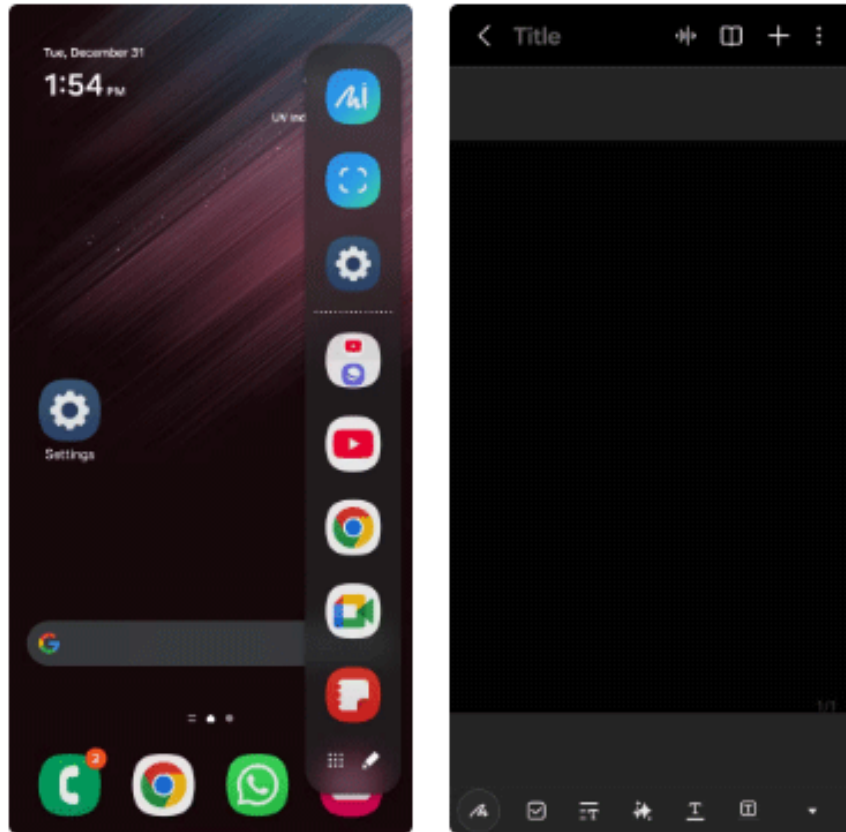

5. Create quick notes

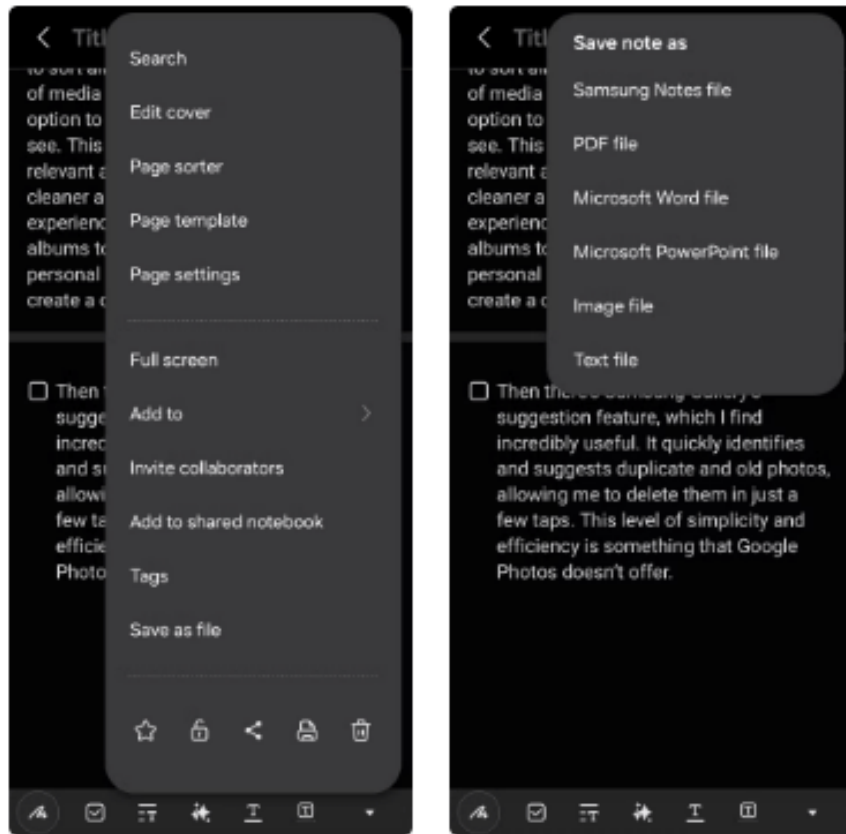

While it is functional, it takes up a significant amount of space and still requires you to unlock your device first.

6. Export notes to DOCX or PDF

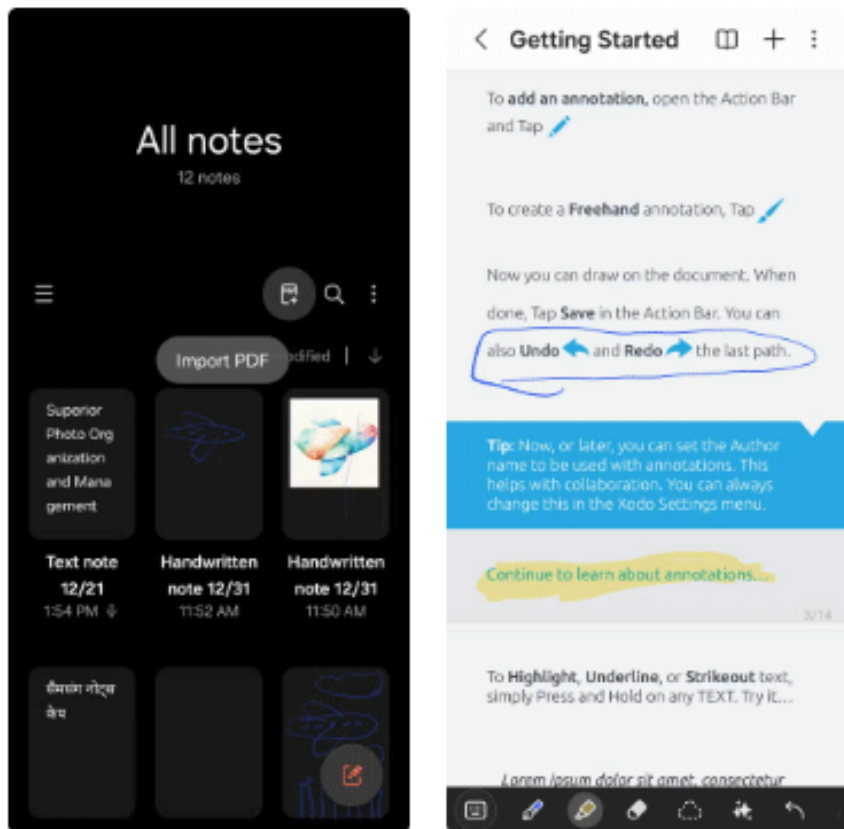
Sometimes you may need to share your notes with colleagues or friends, and Samsung Notes makes this process incredibly easy. It offers the option to convert notes into DOCX or PDF files. The PDF option is especially useful when you want to keep the original formatting, while the DOCX format is ideal if you want your notes to remain editable.



Samsung Notes even allows you to save notes as images, text files, or PowerPoint files. Google Keep, on the other hand, is more limited, only offering the ability to export notes as Google Docs documents, which may seem a bit limiting for many people's needs.?????

7. Seamless PDF annotation

When it comes to annotating PDFs, there's no need for a dedicated app or switching to a computer. Samsung Notes lets you import PDFs and easily add comments, highlights, and even drawings.



It's perfect for last-minute edits or when you need to review a document away from your desk. Google Keep, on the other hand, doesn't have this feature, forcing users to rely on a separate app for annotation.
