Water guinea pigs can weigh up to 60kg, even one has seen a hamster weighing 105.4kg. Mature hamsters have a body length of about 1.4m, about 0.6m high.



This giant rat can live both on land and underwater due to its webbed feet. They often live in dense areas with rivers, lakes, marshes, and mainly grass and aquatic plants. They are able to dive deep and hold their breath underwater for about 5 minutes.

Water guinea pigs often live in flocks of about 10-20. Their average life expectancy is 8-10 years but in natural conditions, not many children can reach that level by being hunted by the skin and becoming food for other species such as giant python Anaconda.



Python python giant Anaconda, the world's largest python species lives in the Amazon, South America basin. An adult python can reach 10m long and weigh up to 750kg, its circumference up to 1.2m. This python is very strong, it can kill and swallow huge animals such as deer, muntjac, crocodile, buffalo, cow . and especially hamsters, their favorite food.
