

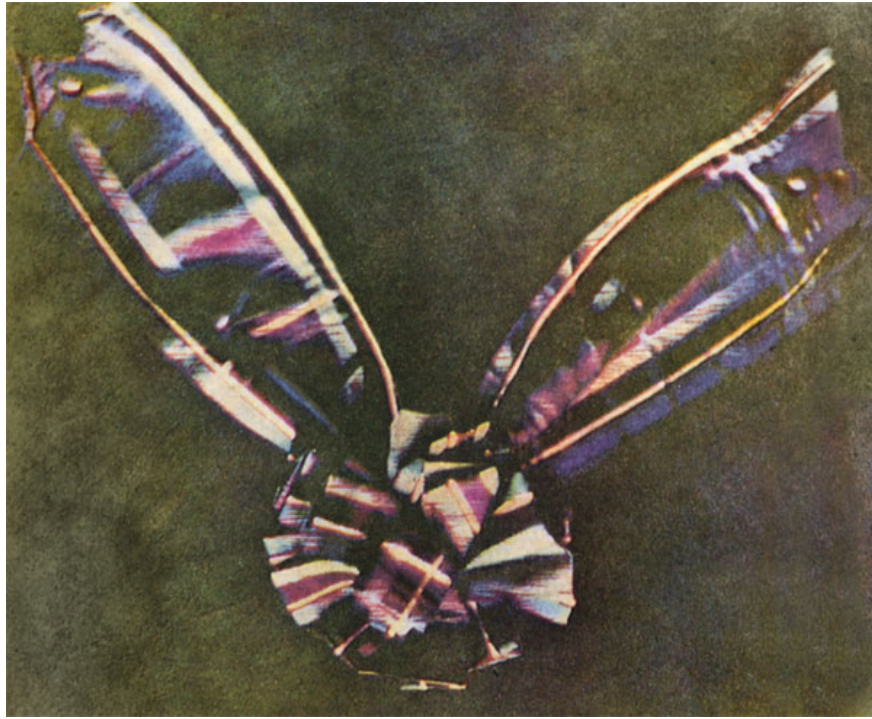
The first 11 photos in the world

Surely you will be surprised when you see the first photo, the first color picture, the first portrait picture, the first aerial photo ... in the history of human photography.

The first photo in the world was taken in 1826 by Joseph Nicéphore Niépce in the Burgundy region of France. Images are taken with a combination of asphalt covering a piece of glass or metal, a process called heliography.



The first color photograph in the world was taken in 1861 by mathematician James Clerk Maxwell.



The world's first digital photo was taken in 1957 by Russell Kirsch taking his son with a resolution of only 176 x 176 pixels.



The world's first portrait was taken by Robert Cornelius in 1839. Cornelius prepared the camera and then clicked it himself and sat in front of the camera for almost 1 minute at a location on Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, USA.



The first aerial photo taken from a hot air balloon by photographer James Wallace Black made from an altitude of over 600 meters. The photo took the town of Boston in the USA.



The first solar image was taken on April 2, 1845, by two French physicists, Louis Fizeau and Leon Foucault, through a process called Daguerreotype at a speed of 1/60 second.

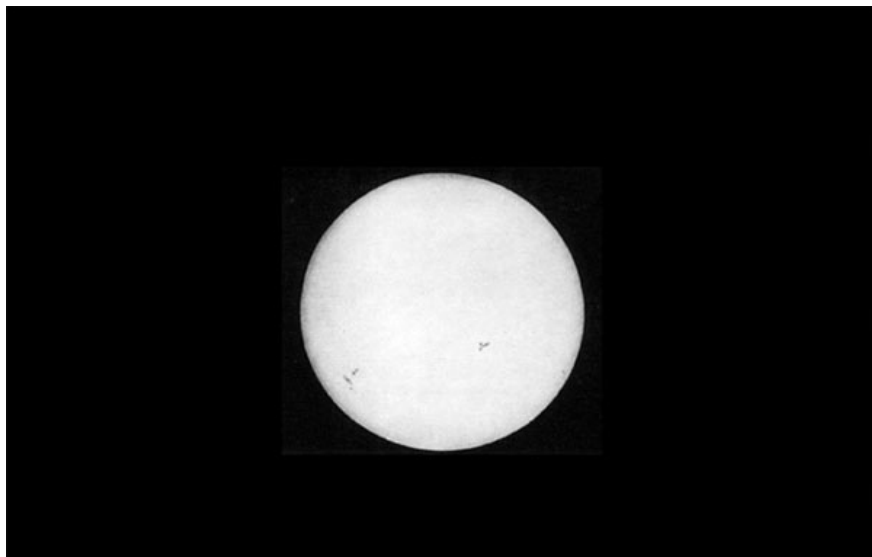
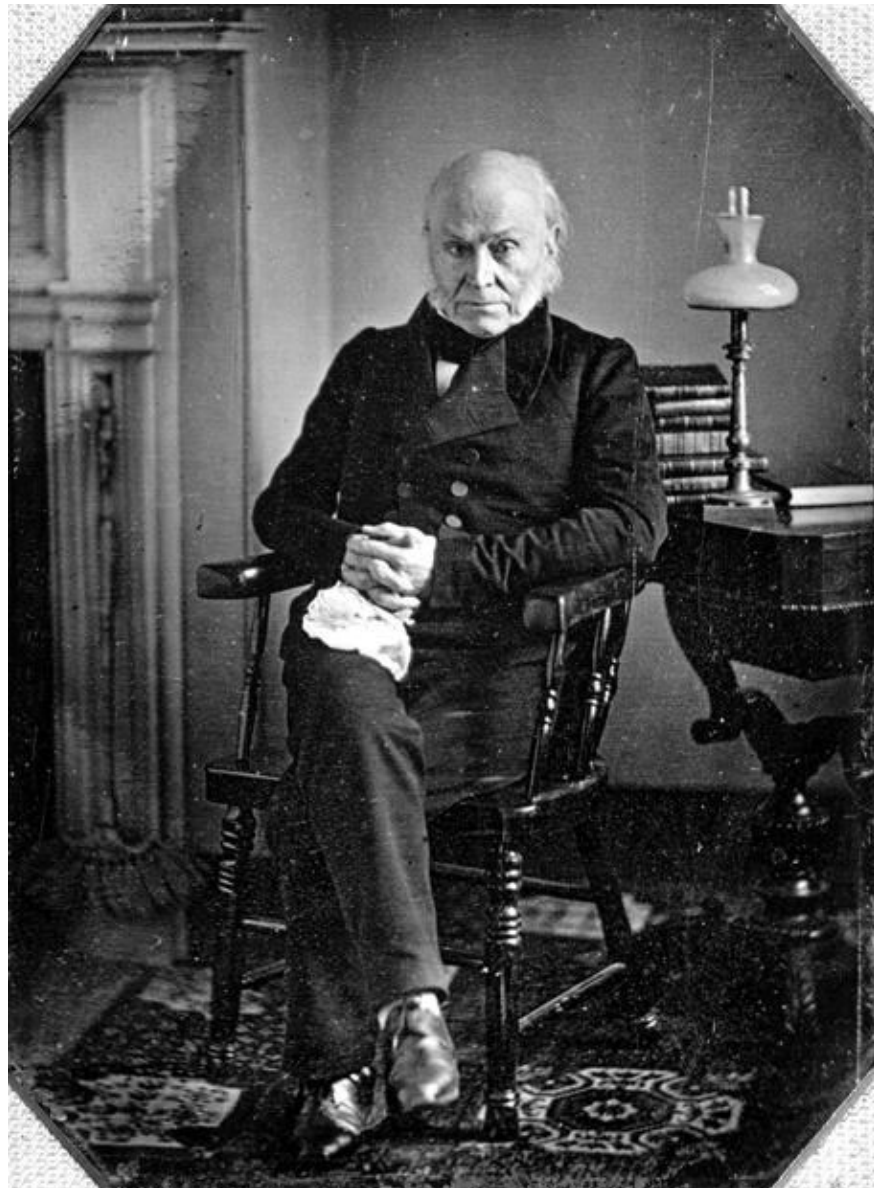


Photo taken to convey the world's first news depicting a man arrested in France taken in 1847.
