

The most difficult language to learn in the world, 10 years of learning are basic communication

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There are approximately 2,700 languages ??with over 7000 different dialects used in the world. Each language has its own difficulty. If rankings are difficult to learn, **Pirarra** , the dialect of the primitive tribe living in the Amazon region, certainly tops the table. Let's find out why this language is so "difficult".

Pirarra has no writing, only uses 3 vowels and 8 consonants but many of the specific sounds in this language have the same meaning as a word. Besides, unlike popular Western languages ??that divide verbs into future and past tense, verbs in pirarra can have up to 65,000 variations and coordinate with each other.





In particular, **Pirarra uses both singing, whistling and other expressions to communicate.** Aboriginal people of this tribe also rely on deep sounds, with distant levels to communicate in the jungle and under tropical rain.

In Pirarra, accents play a very important role, sometimes counterpart words like "friends" or "enemies" differ only in accents, according to linguist professor Rolf Theil, the head of the study said.



According to linguists, Pirarra is extremely complex and has a very special pronunciation system, an "alien" who has an average memory of 10 years of learning to be able to communicate primarily in this language. .

Currently, the original Pirarra tribe has only about 350 people living along the Maicí River, the Brazilian Amazon forest area.

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
