

Top 4 best video editing software on Mac

If you have a Mac, there are many professional video processing software to choose from. However, not all are optimal and easy to use, so this article will help you summarize the top 4 best video editing software for Mac.

1. iMovie

If you are new to video editing, one of the best editors to start with is [Apple iMovie](#). The software is free for beginners, but it also combines ease of use with a fairly advanced feature set. You can't build a feature film project using this software, but if you just want to put a quick video on YouTube, iMovie will do it for you.



This is a great option if you record videos on your iPhone, which is also available for iOS. So you can edit the video on your iPhone / iPad and finish it on your Mac. iMovie also handles 4K footage, you don't have to worry about whether high resolution is supported or not.

2. Final Cut Pro X

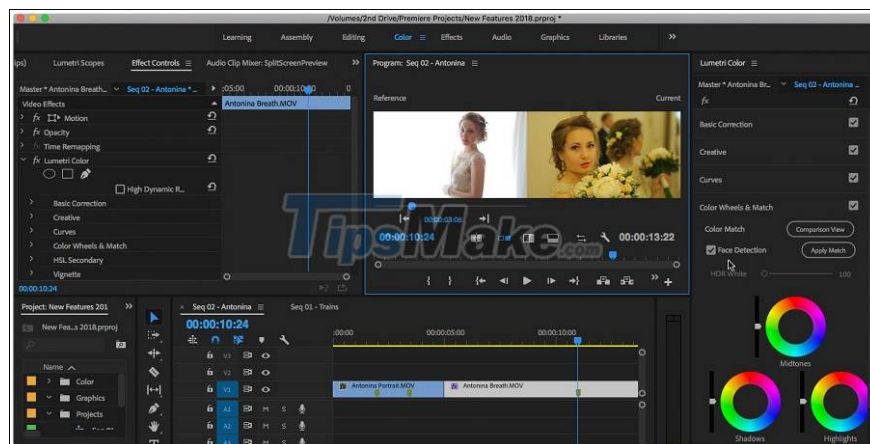
If iMovie doesn't seem to be enough for you, Apple has another option. [Final Cut Pro X](#) is a step up in almost every respect. Final Cut Pro is easier to use than some other video editors, but it's powerful enough for professionals to use regularly. This software has everything you need to organize, trim and perfect your videos.



Final Cut Pro X is not free but not as expensive as some other professional video editing software. While comparable software can cost thousands of dollars, Final Cut Pro X will only get you \$ 299.

3. Adobe Premiere Pro

Another popular option, [Adobe Premiere Pro](#) will be a tool familiar to video professionals. Unlike Final Cut Pro X (which uses its own interface style), Premiere Pro's layout is similar to other video editors. If you are used to video editing, this is a plus, but it can cause some problems for beginners.



However, Adobe Premiere Pro has become an industry standard for a good reason, and you'll find plenty of tools and tutorials built into Premiere. Unlike Final Cut Pro, Premiere Pro is not available for purchase. Instead, it is offered as part of the subscription. You can only subscribe to Premiere Pro for \$ 20.99 per month, or the full Adobe Creative Cloud (CC) for \$ 52.99 per month.

4. DaVinci Resolve

If you're looking for free software but think iMovie is too limited, [DaVinci Resolve](#) is a better fit. You can use this app for free, even to edit 4K footage, but it's native to Hollywood, so you know it has a lot of power. DaVinci started out as a color grading tool, so if you want to work with color, opt for it.



Recent versions of DaVinci Resolve take ideas from old tape-based editing systems to make cutting videos simpler. With the new 'Source Tape', DaVinci Resolve aggregates your footage into a single virtual tape making finding them fast and easy.

There are many other video editors available for Mac, but if you're not sure where to start, one of the four options above will be right for you. If you don't have the budget yet, start with a free option. If you know you need development with a powerful feature set, it's time to try one of the paid options.
