

Top 5 best trackball mice 2021

Trackball mice have never been as marketable as traditional computer mice, but they also have a loyal fan base for a variety of reasons. In the article below, TipsMake gives a list of the best trackball mice this year.

If you've never used trackball mice, then you might wonder why they are so popular. Unlike traditional mice, which have to move your hand to point at the desired position on the screen, with trackball mice you only have to click with your finger. A lot of people love this style because mouse movement affects a lot of things.

Design options for trackball mice are generally divided into two categories: thumb movement with the smaller ball on the side and finger movement other than the ball in the middle and fairly large in size. The second design gives you more finger flexibility, but the thumb-moving patterns are more popular.

1. Logitech MX ERGO

Logitech has long dominated the trackball mouse market and it is not surprising that the company lately claims its products as the market leader. Logitech's MX ERGO combines the classic form factor with modern comforts that no trackball mouse is on the market today.



Top gadgets include all the standard mouse features you need, along with the handy Logitech wireless connectivity (USB dongle and Bluetooth) for use with multiple PCs or mobile devices at the same time . It also includes a tilted stand for placing the marbles at a vertical angle, which can help avoid fatigue from repeated mouse manipulations during a workday.

The push button allows for precise small movements. The downside of the MX ERGO is its design unsuitable for left-handed people (a common problem with thumb trackball mice on the market).

2. Kensington Expert Wireless

If you prefer a larger side ball, your options will be quite limited. Among high-end products, the Kensington Expert Wireless trackball mouse is the closest competitor to the CST Laser at half the price.



Kensington's design includes a more intuitive scroll wheel around the marbles that doesn't require the user to put their hand on a ball to scroll the page. Four finger buttons can be reinstalled to provide additional user flexibility. It comes with free wrist rest - a big plus if you're switching to a trackball mouse.

3. Logitech M570

The M570 has been Logitech's only trackball mouse for years, and now that the ultra-premium MX series is available, the M570 becomes the alternative in case of budget shortages. Although it doesn't have fancy dual wireless modes or multiple reset buttons, the AA battery can provide up to 1 year of use. M570 is still the product that many trackball users love because of its great design, long battery life and light weight, easy to carry on the go.



Currently, there are two designs widely available on the market, one with the old Logitech branding and the other with the new 'Logi' logo, however they are functionally identical. There's also a newer trackball mouse from Logitech, the M575, which has Bluetooth and works with a lot of devices, but it's a bit more expensive.

4. Elecom M-HT1URBK

Trackball mouse for gaming is a potential market. One outstanding product among them is Elecom's M-HT1URBK. Its 1500 DPI optical sensor isn't too good for a gaming mouse, but hardware that switches quickly to instantly boost from 500 to 1000 to 1500 is a must-have if you're playing an inter game. keep changing variables. The design of more than eight buttons on either side of the marble means you'll have plenty of options for things like melee attack or weapon switch. In addition, the mouse includes a wrist rest.



5. Kensington Orbit Wireless

The portable trackball mouse is another sub-category that doesn't have too many options. This is odd, as the standard design is much larger and less travel-friendly than a regular mouse. Kensington Orbit Wireless has a standardized design with a medium-sized ball and integrated touch wheel.



Kensington Orbit Wireless is appreciated for its design that can be used with both hands. But what's surprising is that this mouse doesn't have Bluetooth, only an RF dongle (meaning it doesn't work with phones or tablets without an adapter cable). However, this mouse only costs under \$ 35, which is great for the budget.
