

Why doesn't Apple allow iPhone to record calls?

One thing that makes many Apple users uncomfortable is that the iPhone does not allow call recording using the software available on the device.

iPhone users have been complaining for many years about not being able to record calls on this smartphone. No matter how many times you "dig" through the Settings section, it's just a waste of time, because Apple intentionally does not support features that many people expect.

These are not only people who have to make many important phone calls or interviews, but sometimes only users with normal needs, rarely need the recording feature to avoid missing important details in a conversation. In recent iOS generations, Apple has added support for a very convenient Screen Recording feature. But unfortunately, even though other apps record normally, the call content is always out of the company's concern.



Why does Apple insist on not allowing users to record on iPhone?

The answer is actually very simple: Unlike Android, which has open source code, iOS is under the full control and responsibility of Apple, so this operating system and the company are subject to many restrictions on management regulations. In many states in the US and some regions around the world, call recording is not legal, and the number of iPhone users is so large that controlling such a feature with Apple is out of reach.

To reduce the "headache", Apple chose the simpler move of not supporting this feature from the beginning. ' *While recording phone conversations is not illegal in every state, Apple wants to Make sure people stay compliant by not automatically adding this feature to their smartphones. In addition, Apple wants to ensure user privacy when using smartphones.*'

In addition to not having a built-in call recording feature, Apple also doesn't allow apps to directly access the microphone and Phone app, so it can be difficult to get around that restriction, but there are ways to get around

the rule. "

How to record calls on iPhone simply?

Although some apps advertise support for call recording on iPhone, because Apple does not allow third parties to access the microphone, the trick these apps use is to use a participating server. Enter the conference call and record it. This method will not guarantee your security, moreover all apps require payment, so in reality this is not a good plan.

The only way today that is both free, easy to use, and most convenient is to record "traditionally" with a second device. Specifically, you just need to turn on the iPhone speaker, find a quiet area, make a call and record it all with another device. On MacBook or iPhone, native recording software is available, Voice Memos (Record if you switch the device to Vietnamese). On Windows, you can use the Windows Sound Recorder application.
