

Why should you use an Android TV Box instead of a Smart TV?

Instead of spending tens of millions of VND on a new TV, consider switching to a dedicated Android TV streaming box.

Many people have owned an LG 75-inch Smart TV for about 10 years, and its picture quality has never disappointed them. Instead, it's the Smart TV apps that have garnered more criticism than praise. A few additions to the living room will make evening TV viewing much more enjoyable, and they can still enjoy the beauty of their 4K for many more years.

After becoming frustrated with slow apps, outdated software, and choppy internet performance on their Smart TVs, many people decide it's time for a change. Instead of spending tens of millions of VND on a new TV, they consider switching to a dedicated Android TV streaming box.

Don't rely on built-in software.



Most people initially use the Smart TV software that comes with their TV. But after countless disconnections from the TV, even when connected directly via Ethernet to the router, people realize they need a change. Those days of fumbling through incomplete menus are over when you use an Android TV Box for your family. Many people choose the Google TV Streamer 4K, an option that will give you hours of seamless use.

LG's proprietary software, webOS, is not very user-friendly, extremely slow, and more frustrating than it should be. With Android TV, or even Apple TV, you have dedicated hardware that allows you to browse streaming apps, play games, and do much more with your TV than you might think. You might lose an HDMI port in the process, but the pain of waiting hours for streaming apps to launch on your Smart TV will be gone forever.

Don't forget the physical media players.

We are more connected than ever before, but sometimes, that connection still fails.



If you don't want to go out and buy a dedicated media player to connect to your TV, there's still another option for media enthusiasts. The latest generation of game consoles, especially the Xbox Series X and PlayStation 5, also function as Blu-ray/DVD players. They also have many popular streaming apps, eliminating the need for an Android TV/Apple TV streaming box and making your Smart TV smarter. However, if your home internet connection is down, it might be time to start rebuilding that physical media collection.

If you have a PlayStation 5 or Xbox Series console at home, you can even purchase a dedicated media remote to make browsing the app list easier than ever. Xbox even offers a built-in remote control feature within the Xbox app, allowing you to switch between different pages directly on the touchscreen.

Rules for accessing smart home features on TVs

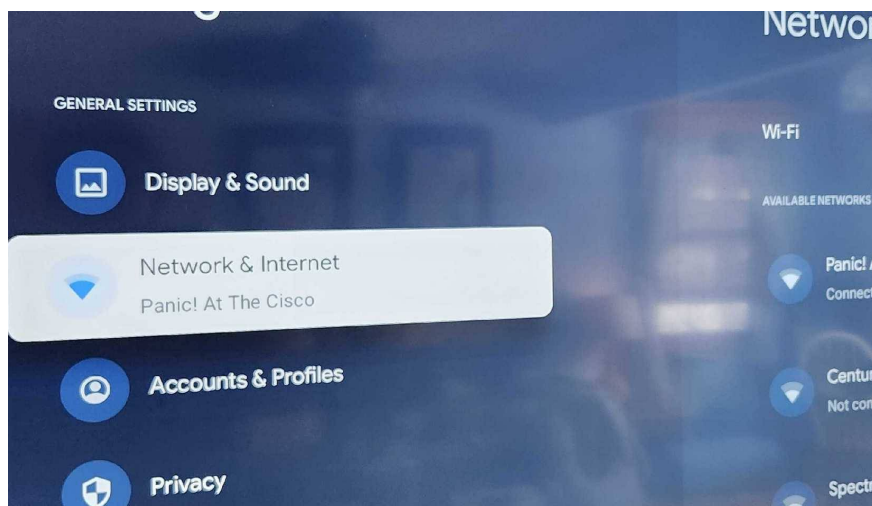
This might be enough to completely eliminate Smart TVs.

That's why using physical means in case is so helpful, for example, using a digital antenna to catch local channels, or using a place like a local library to watch movies when the weather outside is bad.

Having a backup of physical media and other things to do in case of a network outage is a great idea and demonstrates why Smart TVs aren't always as smart as we think.
