

Why are users still satisfied even though the iPhone Air only has a single camera?

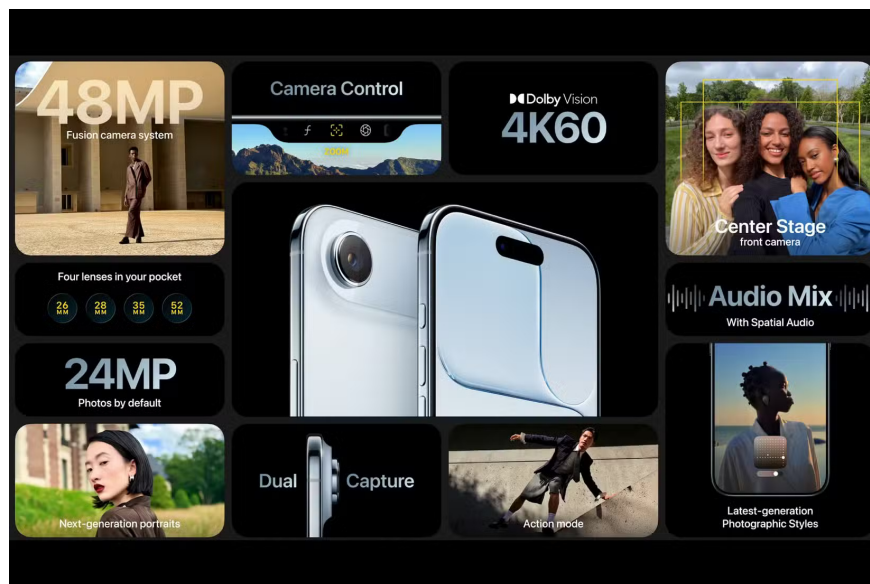
After all, even if the standard iPhone 17 also has a dual-camera setup, the Air's single-lens camera might be a deal-breaker for some users.
