Phase 4 of the Marvel Cinematic Universe officially concluded with the special episode *Guardians of the Galaxy Holiday*. Released late last year, it marked the end of a thrilling, action-packed chapter in the cinematic history of the MCU.

Phase 4 saw the release of a significant number of new MCU Disney+ movies and series, nearly equaling the total of the first three phases combined. Disney+ became a new platform for Marvel storytelling, bringing shows like WandaVision, The Falcon and the Winter Soldier, Loki, Hawkeye, and Moon Knight to fans worldwide. In addition, blockbuster films such as WandaVision, The Falcon and the Winter Soldier, Loki, Hawkeye, and Moon Knight were also released during this phase. Furthermore, fans were able to enjoy special programs like Werewolf by Night and The Guardians of the Galaxy Holiday Special at the end of this phase.

The order of Marvel films by release date.

The Marvel Cinematic Universe is built in several different phases, so you can follow these films in the order of each phase. This is also a way to experience Marvel films in chronological order of their release. Specifically, the phases and the films are as follows:



1. Iron Man (2008) – The birth of Iron Man and the MCU

Iron Man opens the Marvel Cinematic Universe, centering on Tony Stark – an arrogant tech genius and owner of the Stark Industries arms corporation. During a tour of duty in Afghanistan, Tony is kidnapped by terrorists and forced to build weapons. Instead, he creates the first Iron Man suit to escape.

Returning to America, Tony decides to close down his weapons division and upgrade the Iron Man suit to become a superhero. The film focuses on Tony's inner transformation, from an irresponsible capitalist to someone shouldering the responsibility of protecting the world. The villain Obadiah Stane represents the dark side of the war industry. The post-credit scene with Nick Fury officially lays the groundwork for the Avengers Initiative, ushering in the MCU era.

2. The Incredible Hulk (2008) – The Tragedy of Bruce Banner

The film tells the story of Bruce Banner, a scientist transformed into the Hulk after a failed gamma-ray experiment. Banner lives on the run from the US government, trying to control his rage while also searching for a cure. General Ross sees the Hulk as a threat and creates Abomination – an even more dangerous creature. The confrontation between Hulk and Abomination shows that uncontrolled power always comes with a great price. The film explores Banner's tragic and lonely experiences and lays the groundwork for the Hulk in the MCU. At the end of the film, Tony Stark appears, indirectly connecting the story to the Avengers project.

3. Iron Man 2 (2010) – The Pressure of a Hero

After revealing his identity as Iron Man, Tony Stark became a global icon but also faced pressure from the government and public opinion. His arc reactor gradually poisoned his body, while Ivan Vanko emerged with similar technology seeking revenge against the Stark family. Meanwhile, Justin Hammer represented the dark side of Iron Man's militarization ambitions. Natasha Romanoff made her first appearance as Black Widow, expanding the role of SHIELD. The film emphasizes the price of fame and responsibility, while continuing to build the Avengers lineup.

4. Thor (2011) – The God of Thunder in Exile

Thor introduces the world of Asgard and the Norse gods. Thor, the arrogant prince, is punished by Odin and banished to Earth, losing his powers and Mjolnir. There, he learns lessons of humility and responsibility. Meanwhile, Loki plots to seize the throne of Asgard. The conflict between the two brothers is the emotional core of the film. Thor proves himself worthy of the power of the God of Thunder and returns to Asgard to prevent war between the realms. The film lays the foundation for the cosmic and mythological elements in the MCU.

5. Captain America: The First Avenger (2011) – The Ideal Soldier

Set during World War II, the film tells the story of Steve Rogers – a frail young man with a courageous heart. After participating in the Super Soldier experiment, Steve becomes Captain America. He confronts Hydra, led by Red Skull, who are seeking world domination using the Tesseract. The film celebrates classic values such as bravery, sacrifice, and a sense of justice. At the end of the film, Steve is frozen and awakens in the modern era, setting the stage for Avengers Assemble.

6. The Consultant (One-Shot, 2011) – Behind the Scenes of SHIELD

This short one-shot film, centering on Phil Coulson and Jasper Sitwell, reveals the political machinations within SHIELD. It explains why Tony Stark was sent to approach General Ross after the Hulk incident. The film clarifies the connections between MCU events and shows that SHIELD is not just a protective organization but also a highly strategic one.

7. A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to Thor's Hammer (2011)

This one-shot follows Coulson on his way to New Mexico (before the events of *Thor*). At a gas station, he inadvertently stops a robbery. The short clip shows Coulson not only as a logistics agent but also as a combatant, adding depth to this important supporting character in the MCU.

8. The Avengers (2012) – The first superhero team

Loki returns to Earth with the intention of invading with the Chitauri army. Nick Fury assembles Iron Man, Captain America, Thor, Hulk, Black Widow, and Hawkeye. Initially, internal conflicts cause rifts within the team, but faced with a global threat, they are forced to unite. The Battle of New York becomes an iconic scene in the MCU, affirming the power of teamwork. The film marks a turning point as the Avengers are officially born, ushering in the era of superhero blockbusters.

9. Item 47 (One-Shot, 2012) – The aftermath of Avengers

The story follows two civilians who pick up Chitauri weapons after the Battle of New York and use them to rob a bank. SHIELD must intervene to recover the alien technology. This one-shot highlights the consequences of superhero battles and expands the MCU universe from a more everyday perspective.

10. Iron Man 3 (2013) – Tony Stark's Fear

Following the events of *Avengers*, Tony Stark suffers from anxiety and a phobia of war. He faces an enemy named Mandarin, who later reveals himself to be Aldrich Killian. No longer relying solely on his suit, Tony must use his intellect to fight. The film delves into the character's psychology, showing that Iron Man is not just a suit of armor, but the man Tony Stark is. This is a crucial milestone in Tony's journey of maturation.



11. Agent Carter (One-Shot, 2013) – Peggy Carter solidifies her position.

Set after World War II, *Agent Carter* follows Peggy Carter as she works at the SSR. Despite her exceptional abilities, Peggy is often overlooked in her all-male environment. When Howard Stark is accused of treason, Peggy secretly investigates to clear his name. This one-shot highlights Peggy's intelligence, courage, and independence, while also laying the groundwork for her future leadership of SHIELD. This serves as a crucial stepping stone for the later *Agent Carter series*.

12. Agents of SHIELD – Season 1 (2013–2014)

The first season follows Agent Phil Coulson and his team as they deal with supernatural threats following *The Avengers*. Initially, the show felt like a standalone mission, but it gradually became more closely connected to the MCU. The biggest climax was Hydra's infiltration of SHIELD, directly linked to *Captain America: The Winter Soldier*. Season 1 made it clear that the post-Avengers world is far more complex and dangerous than imagined.

13. Thor: The Dark World (2013) – The War for the Nine Realms

Thor must confront Malekith, the leader of the Dark Elves, who seeks to use the Aether to plunge the universe into darkness. Jane Foster is inadvertently infected by the Aether, forcing Thor to cooperate with Loki. The film expands the Asgardian universe and highlights the complex relationship between the two brothers. The ending reveals Loki usurping Odin's throne, setting the stage for subsequent events.

14. All Hail the King (One-Shot, 2014)

This one-shot clarifies the true identity of the Mandarin in *Iron Man 3*. Trevor Slattery is held captive and becomes the target of a mysterious organization. The film helps resolve the controversies surrounding the Mandarin, while also revealing that the Ten Rings still exist in the MCU.

15. Captain America: The Winter Soldier (2014) – The world is no longer black and white.

Steve Rogers confronts Hydra's global control plot hidden within SHIELD. The truth about Winter Soldier – Bucky Barnes – plunges Steve into a conflict between ideals and friendship. The film has a political and espionage theme, disrupting the MCU's status quo as SHIELD collapses. This is one of the most important works, changing the entire landscape of the Marvel universe.

16. Guardians of the Galaxy (2014)

Peter Quill, along with Rocket, Groot, Gamora, and Drax, inadvertently team up to prevent Ronan from destroying Xandar with the Power Stone. The film is humorous, expands the MCU into outer space, and introduces the concept of the Infinity Stones more clearly. The Guardians become a crucial piece in the future great war.

17. Agents of SHIELD – Season 2 (2014–2015)

After SHIELD's collapse, Coulson rebuilds the organization from scratch. This season introduces the Inhumans and the character Daisy Johnson (Quake). The events are directly linked to *Avengers: Age of Ultron*. Season 2 expands the mutant element in the television MCU.

18. Agent Carter – Season 1 (2015)

Peggy Carter continues to balance her spy work with societal prejudices. The series delves into Peggy's relationships with Howard Stark and Edwin Jarvis, while also portraying her as a rare independent heroine of that era.

19. Daredevil – Season 1 (2015)

Matt Murdock, a blind lawyer with superhuman senses, fights crime in Hell's Kitchen. Opposing Kingpin, Daredevil takes on a darker, more violent, and realistic style than the MCU films. The series opens up the Marvel Netflix franchise with a street-based perspective.

20. Avengers: Age of Ultron (2015) – The Consequences of Control

Tony Stark created Ultron with the intention of protecting Earth, but this AI betrays him and wants to destroy humanity. The Avengers must face the consequences of their own actions. The film introduces Scarlet Witch, Quicksilver, and Vision, and sets the stage for *Civil War* and *Infinity War*.



21. Ant-Man (2015) – The Tiny Hero and the Quantum World

Ant-Man follows Scott Lang, a former criminal with a good heart, chosen by Dr. Hank Pym to succeed the Ant-Man suit. With the ability to shrink in size but increase in strength, Scott must stop Darren Cross – Hank's former protégé – from commercializing the dangerous Yellowjacket technology. The film combines action, humor, and family elements, and introduces **the Quantum Realm** for the first time, a concept that plays a crucial role in *Avengers: Endgame*. *Ant-Man* shows that the MCU is not just about large-scale battles but also focuses on humanity and redemption.

22. Agents of SHIELD – Season 3 (2015–2016)

Season 3 continues to explore the world of the Inhumans after the emergence of many individuals with superpowers. Daisy Johnson becomes central to the story as she confronts her origins and powers. Simultaneously, Coulson's team must confront the Hive – an ancient threat directly linked to the Inhumans. The events of this season run parallel to *Captain America: Civil War*, reflecting the consequences of a world increasingly filled with superhumans. Season 3 clarifies the conflict between control and freedom, significantly expanding the MCU on the small screen.

23. Jessica Jones – Season 1 (2015)

Jessica Jones is a former superhero with superhuman powers but deep psychological trauma. She opens a private detective agency in New York and confronts Kilgrave, a mind-controlling villain and a nightmare from her past. The series delves deeply into psychological issues, mental abuse, and control, with a dark and mature tone. It is considered one of Marvel Netflix's best works, expanding the MCU in a more realistic and darker direction.

24. Agent Carter – Season 2 (2016)

Peggy Carter moves to Los Angeles to investigate a case involving dangerous technology. Season 2 expands the world of post-war espionage while delving into Peggy's personal life. The series further solidifies Peggy Carter's pioneering role in laying the foundation for SHIELD, even though the series was canceled after this season.

25. Daredevil – Season 2 (2016)

Matt Murdock faces two major threats: the Punisher – who punishes criminals with extreme violence, and the return of Elektra and her organization, The Hand. Season 2 raises questions about the moral boundaries between

heroism and justice. The Punisher became a beloved character and later got his own series.

26. Captain America: Civil War (2016) – Avengers divided

Following numerous incidents resulting in casualties, the government introduced the Sokovia Accords to control superheroes. Steve Rogers opposed them, while Tony Stark supported them. The conflict escalated into a civil war among the Avengers. The film introduced **Black Panther** and **Spider-Man**, while also disbanding the Avengers team and setting the stage for *Infinity War*.

27. Team Thor (One-Shot, 2016)

This humorous one-shot reveals what Thor and Hulk were doing during *Civil War*. Thor was living with Darryl, providing a fun and lighthearted perspective for the MCU.

28. Agents of SHIELD – Season 4 (2016–2017)

Season 4 was highly praised for its three major arcs: Ghost Rider, LMD (Life Model Decoy), and Framework. The series explored artificial intelligence, ego, and virtual reality, taking on a darker and more philosophical tone. It was considered the best season of the series.

29. Luke Cage – Season 1 (2016)

Luke Cage possesses indestructible skin, protecting Harlem from crime. The series focuses on the Black community, social injustice, and power dynamics. Luke Cage embodies a distinctly street-style aesthetic within the MCU.

30. Doctor Strange (2016) – The Multiverse Door Opens

Stephen Strange, a brilliant surgeon, loses his ability to practice after an accident. In his quest for a cure, he enters the magical world and becomes the Sorcerer Supreme. The film introduces **the multiverse**, **the Time Loop**, and the Time Stone – key elements of the post-MCU era.

31. Team Thor: Part 2 (One-Shot, 2017)

Team Thor: Part 2 continues the humorous one-shot from the previous installment, showing Thor and Darryl still living together while the Avengers are busy. This time, Bruce Banner pays a visit after returning from Sakaar. The film is entertaining and doesn't directly affect the main storyline, but it helps audiences understand more about Thor and Banner's everyday personalities. This one-shot serves as a 'light pause' before the MCU enters a darker phase.

32. Iron Fist – Season 1 (2017)

Danny Rand returns to New York after years of disappearance and claims to be the heir to Rand Enterprises. He is trained by monks at K'un-Lun and possesses the Iron Fist powers. The series focuses on martial arts, personal identity, and power struggles. Despite receiving mixed reviews, Iron Fist contributes to the overall picture of street heroes in the MCU.

33. Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 2 (2017)

Set immediately after the first film, the Guardians continue their adventures in space. Peter Quill discovers his true identity and confronts Ego – his biological father and a dangerous entity. The film delves into themes of family, kinship, and choice. Yondu's emotional sacrifice becomes a crucial emotional highlight of the MCU.

34. Spider-Man: Homecoming (2017)

Peter Parker returns to school life after *Civil War*. He tries to prove himself worthy of being an Avenger while confronting Vulture – a villain with very ordinary motives. The film emphasizes maturity, responsibility, and Tony Stark's role as a mentor. This is the youngest, most relatable Spider-Man in the MCU.

35. The Defenders – Season 1 (2017)

Daredevil, Jessica Jones, Luke Cage, and Iron Fist join forces to fight The Hand in New York. The series connects Marvel Netflix's street-themed storylines, delivering a major crossover event. Despite its short runtime, The Defenders marks a significant milestone for this group of heroes in the MCU.

36. Inhumans – Season 1 (2017)

Inhumans tells the story of the Inhuman royal family on the Moon, forced to flee to Earth after a coup. The series explored themes of power and class, but failed to live up to expectations and was canceled after one season. Nevertheless, it remains an official part of the MCU timeline.

37. Thor: Ragnarok (2017) – The Rebirth of the God of Thunder

Thor is stranded on the planet Sakaar and must fight to return to Asgard, where Hela threatens to destroy his home planet. The film completely changes Thor's tone: humorous, vibrant, yet still tragic. Asgard is destroyed, paving the way for the events of *Infinity War*.

38. The Punisher – Season 1 (2017)

Frank Castle confronts his past and the conspiracies behind his family's death. The series focuses on war, psychological trauma, and violence, making it one of the most intense series in the MCU. The Punisher becomes a distinctly anti-hero.

39. Runaways – Season 1 (2017–2018)

A group of teenagers discover their parents are members of the villainous organization Pride. They run away and learn to be heroes in their own way. The series has a youthful feel, different from other MCU works.

40. Agents of SHIELD – Season 5 (2017–2018)

Coulson's team is transported to a post-apocalyptic future and must find a way to prevent disaster. This season directly links to *Avengers: Infinity War*, showing the potential consequences of failure. This is a major turning point for the series.



41. Black Panther (2018)

Following the death of King T'Chaka, T'Challa returns to Wakanda to inherit the throne. He must confront Erik Killmonger – a man of Wakandan blood who grew up consumed by hatred and seeks to overthrow the world order. The film delves deeply into themes of identity, heritage, colonialism, and the responsibilities of power. Wakanda opens its doors to the world for the first time, marking a major turning point in the MCU. Killmonger is considered one of Marvel's most complex villains.

42. Team Darryl (One-Shot, 2018)

Team Darryl continues the series of humorous one-shots revolving around Darryl – Thor's former roommate. This time, Darryl moves in with the Grandmaster after Thor leaves Sakaar. The content is purely for entertainment and does not affect the main storyline. This one-shot helps ease the tension before Infinity War and concludes the 'Team Thor' short film series.

43. Jessica Jones – Season 2 (2018)

Jessica investigates the origins of her powers and uncovers inhumane experiments involving her own mother. This season focuses on psychological trauma, family relationships, and the ethics of possessing superpowers. While less action-packed, the series delves deep into the characters' inner lives, offering a very different perspective within the MCU.

44. Avengers: Infinity War (2018)

Thanos began collecting the Infinity Stones in an attempt to wipe out half of all life in the universe. The Avengers, Guardians, and their allies joined forces but failed. The snap that ended the film created the biggest shock in MCU history. Infinity War was a dark turning point, breaking the familiar victory motif of the superhero genre.

45. Cloak & Dagger – Season 1 (2018)

Tandy Bowen and Tyrone Johnson possess the powers of light and darkness after a childhood accident. The series explores social issues such as injustice, abuse of power, and personal trauma. The two characters must learn to work together to fight dark forces in New Orleans. The storyline is independent but still part of the

MCU.

46. Luke Cage – Season 2 (2018)

Luke becomes a heroic icon of Harlem but faces the pressures of power and new gangs. Bushmaster emerges as a clearly motivated villain. The season questions how power should be used to protect the community without corrupting it.

47. Ant-Man and the Wasp (2018)

Scott Lang teams up with Hope van Dyne to rescue Janet from the Quantum Realm. The film is lighthearted and humorous, but the after-credits scene connects directly to Infinity War, where Scott is trapped in the Quantum Realm after Thanos' snap.

48. Iron Fist – Season 2 (2018)

Danny Rand loses his Iron Fist powers and must rediscover his purpose in life. The series is a significant improvement over season 1, focusing on responsibility and legacy. Colleen Wing emerges as a new Iron Fist, opening up a different path for the character's development.

49. Daredevil – Season 3 (2018)

Matt Murdock confronts Kingpin after Fisk's release. The series returns to its dark, legal, and moral core. Kingpin is incredibly well-developed, making Daredevil season 3 one of Marvel's most highly acclaimed series.

50. Runaways – Season 2 (2018)

The Runaways continue to evade Pride and confront the consequences of their parents' decisions. Relationships deepen, and conflicts become increasingly complex. The series expands the world of superpowers from a teenage perspective.

51. The Punisher – Season 2 (2019)

Frank Castle attempts to live in anonymity, but his past won't let him go. When he uncovers a conspiracy involving the government and his family, Frank is forced back into violence. This season delves deeper into the relationship between Frank and Billy Russo, while also highlighting the Punisher's internal conflict: is he a protector or a war addict? The series concludes Frank's journey in the MCU Netflix with a stark look at justice and revenge.

52. Captain Marvel (2019)

Set in 1995, Carol Danvers is a Kree warrior suffering from amnesia, gradually discovering her Earth origins and true powers. The film reveals the Kree–Skrull war, the formation of SHIELD, and the role of Nick Fury. Captain Marvel becomes one of the most powerful characters in the MCU, holding a pivotal position in Endgame.



53. Avengers: Endgame (2019)

After their defeat at the hands of Thanos, the Avengers lived in grief and despair. Thanks to the Quantum Realm, they traveled back in time to collect the Infinity Stones. The final battle concluded the Infinity Saga, with the death of Iron Man and the departure of Captain America. Endgame was an emotional farewell to the first generation of MCU heroes.

54. Agents of SHIELD – Season 6 (2019)

Coulson's team continues to protect Earth from new cosmic threats. The appearance of Sarge – who looks exactly like Coulson – raises many questions. The season has a strong science fiction feel, somewhat separate from Endgame but still maintaining the spirit of the MCU.

55. Spider-Man: Far From Home (2019)

Peter Parker attempts to enjoy a European vacation after Endgame but is dragged into a new mission by Nick Fury. Mysterio emerges as a false hero. The film explores the pressure of inheriting Iron Man's legacy and ends with a major twist: Spider-Man's identity is revealed to the world.

56. Runaways – Season 3 (2019)

The Runaways confront Morgan le Fay, a powerful sorceress from the Dark Dimension. Nico must face the price of magic, while the group matures through their losses. The series concludes with tragedy, ending the Runaways' journey in the MCU.

57. Agents of SHIELD – Season 7 (2020)

The final season takes the SHIELD team on a time-traveling journey through various periods of history. They fight to protect the timeline from Chronicoms. The series concludes the journey of the characters, especially Daisy Johnson and Phil Coulson.

58. Hellstrom (2020)

Daimon and Ana Helstrom – the daughter of a supernatural killer – hunt down demonic forces. The series had a horror feel, almost entirely separate from the mainstream MCU. Helstrom was later discontinued due to a change

in Marvel Television's direction.

59. WandaVision (2021)

Wanda Maximoff lives in a fictional sitcom town to escape the pain of losing Vision. The series opens up the multiverse, introduces Scarlet Witch, and the concept of distorted reality. This marks the beginning of Phase 4 of the MCU on Disney+.

60. The Falcon and the Winter Soldier (2021)

Sam Wilson and Bucky Barnes confront the post-Captain America world. The series revolves around the legacy of the shield, nationalism, and heroic responsibility. Sam officially becomes the new Captain America, ushering in the next era of the MCU.

61. Loki – Season 1 (2021)

In 2012, Loki escaped with the Tesseract and was captured by the Time Variance Authority for disrupting the timeline. At TVA, Loki teamed up with Mobius to track down another dangerous variant of himself. This journey led to the truth about TVA and the mastermind behind the control of the multiverse. The ending introduces He Who Remains, opening the Multiverse Saga and completely altering the timeline structure of the MCU.

62. Black Widow (2021)

Set between Civil War and Infinity War, Natasha Romanoff confronts her past as the Red Room reappears. She reunites with Yelena, Alexei, and Melina to destroy the Black Widow training system. The film concludes Natasha's personal story while introducing Yelena Belova as her spiritual successor.

63. What If...? – Season 1 (2021)

The animated series explores 'what if' scenarios in the multiverse: Peggy Carter becomes Captain Carter, Doctor Strange destroys reality, Ultron wins the war, the Watchers intervene for the first time, and the Guardians of the Multiverse assemble to save the multiverse.

64. Shang-Chi and the Legend of the Ten Rings (2021)

Shang-Chi confronts his father Wenwu and the Ten Rings organization. The rings possess ancient power, linked to greater forces. The film introduces a new hero, connecting Eastern mythology with the modern MCU.

65. Eternals (2021)

The Eternals – immortal entities created by the Celestials – reunite to prevent the awakening of a Celestial within Earth. The film expands on the history of the MCU universe, questioning free will and the fate of humanity.

66. Hawkeye (2021)

Clint Barton wants to go home for Christmas but gets drawn into the New York underworld. Kate Bishop becomes his apprentice, and Yelena pursues Clint over Natasha's death. The series officially introduces Kingpin into the MCU.

67. Spider-Man: No Way Home (2021)

Peter Parker's identity is revealed, Doctor Strange causes a multiverse crash. Villains and Spider-Man from other universes appear. Peter accepts the sacrifice to fix reality, starting over from scratch.

68. Moon Knight (2022)

Steven Grant and Marc Spector share a body, serving the god Khonshu. The series explores multiple personality disorder, Egyptian mythology, and a hero with dark psychological complexities.

69. Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness (2022)

Doctor Strange protects America Chavez from Scarlet Witch. The film delves into the multiverse, the consequences of WandaVision, and the price of power. Scarlet Witch confronts her personal tragedy.

70. Ms. Marvel (2022)

Kamala Khan – a huge Avengers fan – discovers the power of her family heirloom necklace. The series has a teen vibe, introduces the Inhumans/multiverse in a lighthearted way, and connects directly to Captain Marvel.

71. Thor: Love and Thunder (2022)

Thor rediscovers himself after Endgame but is drawn into a war with Gorr, the God Slayer, who seeks to destroy all the gods. Jane Foster unexpectedly regains control of Mjolnir and becomes Mighty Thor, albeit at the cost of her life. Thor confronts questions about responsibility, love, and the meaning of divinity. The film expands the pantheon of gods while tragically concluding the relationship between Thor and Jane.

72. I Am Groot – Season 1 (2022)

The animated short series revolves around Baby Groot in everyday and humorous moments. Groot explores the universe, causing trouble for the Guardians members. Although lighthearted, the series helps expand the character's personality and complements Guardians of the Galaxy.

73. She-Hulk: Attorney at Law (2022)

Jennifer Walters becomes She-Hulk after an accident involving Bruce Banner's blood. She works as a lawyer while also handling superhero cases. The series is a legal comedy, breaking down the 'fourth wall' and bringing Daredevil back into the MCU.

74. Werewolf By Night (2022)

This exceptional film boasts a classic horror style. The story revolves around Jack Russell and Man-Thing on a hunt for a mysterious monster. The film opens the horror branch of the MCU, introducing new supernatural

characters.

75. Black Panther: Wakanda Forever (2022)

Wakanda grieves after the death of T'Challa. Shuri faces the responsibility of succession while Wakanda clashes with Talokan, led by Namor. The film honors the Black Panther legacy, introduces Ironheart, and expands the underwater world.

76. The Guardians of the Galaxy Holiday Special (2022)

The Guardians celebrate Christmas with Peter Quill. Drax and Mantis bring Kevin Bacon to Knowhere. The film is humorous and deepens the sense of family among the Guardians.

77. Ant-Man and the Wasp: Quantumania (2023)

Scott Lang and his family are drawn into the Quantum Realm, confronting Kang the Conqueror. The film sets the stage for the larger threat of the Multiverse Saga and shows the true extent of Kang's danger.



78. Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 3 (2023)

The story focuses on Rocket's traumatic past. The Guardians confront the High Evolutionary to save Rocket. The film concludes the original team's journey, leaving a deep emotional impact and a meaningful farewell.

79. Secret Invasion (2023)

Nick Fury discovers Skrulls are infiltrating Earth at the highest level. The series has a political and espionage theme, shaking the trust between heroes and governments, and changing the landscape of the MCU after Endgame.

80. I Am Groot – Season 2 (2023)

Season two continues to follow Groot during his teenage years, with short, humorous, and relatable stories. Groot explores his surroundings, interacts with strange creatures, and creates many comical situations. While not directly impacting the larger MCU storyline, the series expands Groot's personality and adds emotional depth to the character before Guardians concludes its cinematic journey.

81. Loki – Season 2 (2023)

Loki continues to grapple with the aftermath of the TVA's collapse. The 'time slip' phenomenon causes him to lose control of himself and forces him to cooperate with Mobius and Sylvie to prevent the multiverse's downfall. This season delves into the nature of freedom, destiny, and Loki's role in the Multiverse Saga, while also solidifying the position of Kang and his variants.

82. The Marvels (2023)

Carol Danvers, Monica Rambeau, and Kamala Khan swap places whenever they use their powers. The three heroines are forced to cooperate to confront the threat from the Kree. The film connects Captain Marvel to the television series, expands the universe, and lays the groundwork for future multiverse events.

83. What If...? – Season 2 (2023)

Season two continues to explore the hypothetical timelines of the MCU. Each episode is a standalone 'what if' scenario, expanding the multiverse imagination and suggesting various possibilities that could affect the main storyline.

84. Echo (2024)

Echo follows Maya Lopez after Hawkeye, as she returns to her hometown and confronts her past. The series has a dark tone, focuses on the characters' inner lives, expands the world of street crime, and connects directly to Daredevil.

85. Deadpool & Wolverine (2024)

Deadpool joins the MCU via the multiverse, teaming up with Wolverine on a mission related to the TVA. The film blends action, dark comedy, and meta-genre elements, marking Deadpool's official appearance in the Marvel Studios timeline.

86. Agatha Christie All Along (2024)

The series revolves around Agatha Harkness after WandaVision. The story explores dark magic, the origins of Agatha's powers, and expands the wizarding world within the MCU.

87. What If...? – Season 3 (2024)

Season three continues to delve deeper into the multiverse with bolder scenarios, concluding the What If animated series and subtly linking to the Multiverse Saga.

88. Captain America: Brave New World (2025)

Sam Wilson officially takes on the role of Captain America amidst a complex global political landscape. The film focuses on the responsibilities, beliefs, and role of the iconic Captain America of the new era.

89. Daredevil: Born Again – Season 1 (2025)

Matt Murdock returns to Hell's Kitchen, confronting Kingpin in a legal and street battle. The series boasts a mature, dark style, redefining Daredevil within the mainstream MCU.

91. Thunderbolts* (2025)

Thunderbolts* centers on a unique team of anti-heroes and former villains such as Yelena Belova, Bucky Barnes, Red Guardian, US Agent, Taskmaster, and Ghost. Under the direction of Valentina Allegra de Fontaine, the group is tasked with secret missions that the Avengers cannot, or should not, interfere with. The film explores internal conflicts, dark pasts, and mutual distrust among its members. Thunderbolts* plays a crucial role in the post-Multiverse Saga era, raising questions about morality, redemption, and the lines between hero and villain in the MCU.

92. Ironheart – Season 1 (2025)

Ironheart follows Riri Williams, a young genius with intelligence on par with Tony Stark. Following the events of Black Panther: Wakanda Forever, Riri continues to develop her own high-tech suit of armor while confronting the underworld of technology and magic. The series explores the conflict between science and magic, as well as the pressure of being the spiritual successor to Iron Man. Ironheart opens up a new direction for the next generation of young superheroes in the MCU.

93. The Fantastic Four: First Steps (2025)

Fantastic Four marks the official debut of the legendary quartet in the MCU. The film focuses on the origins of the powers of Reed Richards, Sue Storm, Johnny Storm, and Ben Grimm, while introducing them to the current superhero world. Instead of recounting the familiar accident details, the film emphasizes family bonds, scientific intelligence, and the role of the Fantastic Four in the multiverse. This is a crucial starting point for Marvel's new Phase.

94. Eyes of Wakanda (2025)

Eyes of Wakanda is an animated series that explores Wakanda's secret history through various periods. The story follows Wakanda warriors and spies as they protect vibranium from falling into the hands of a global enemy. The series expands on Wakanda lore, clarifies the nation's influence on the world before the events of Black Panther, and adds depth to the Marvel universe.

95. Marvel Zombies (2025)

Marvel Zombies is an animated series based on a dark branch of the multiverse where Marvel superheroes are infected with a zombie virus. The surviving characters must fight for survival in a bloody, post-apocalyptic world. The series follows the zombie arc from What If...?, featuring a more mature, violent style and a complete departure from the main MCU timeline.

The order of Marvel films in chronological order.

Another way to experience the Marvel Cinematic Universe is to watch the films in chronological order. This approach will give you a clearer and more comprehensive overview of the Marvel Cinematic Universe.

Captain America: The First Avenger (2011)



This is the fifth film from Marvel, following Iron Man, The Hulk, and Thor. However, it's the first one you should watch if you want to follow the Marvel timeline, as the film takes place during World War II. Through the film, we learn about Steve Rogers' journey to becoming Captain America and his first battles against Hydra and Red Skull. The film also introduces viewers to the Tesseract – the first Infinity Stone with the ability to alter reality.

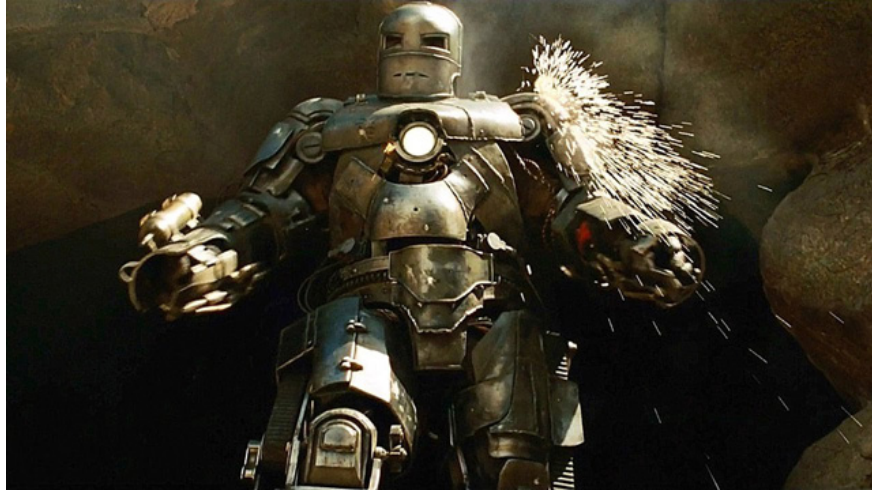
Captain Marvel (2019)



The second film on the list was released in 2019. However, the story takes place in 1995, when Carol Danvers falls to Earth and begins hunting down the Skrulls. The film offers spectacular action sequences as well as a

nostalgic feel for those from the 90s.

Iron Man (2008)



According to the Marvel timeline, Iron Man takes place in 2010. It's the story of Tony Stark, a genius, inventor, philanthropist, and playboy. He's kidnapped by a terrorist organization who wants him to invent the most advanced weapon system. However, Tony designs something more powerful that allows him to escape – the first Iron Man suit.

Iron Man 2 (2010)

The second Iron Man film begins immediately after the events of the first. Tony Stark grapples with the fact that his identity as Iron Man has been revealed. The government wants the technology he uses for his suit, while Tony refuses to hand it over. Another weapons manufacturer also plots to seize the technology, forcing Tony Stark to find a way to counter them.

Iron Man 2 also introduced two other Marvel superheroes: Black Widow and War Machine.

The Incredible Hulk (2008)

The film follows Bruce Banner as he flees from General Thunderbolt Ross and the US military. Realizing he can't fully control the Hulk, Ross decides to create his own version of the Hulk by experimenting on a soldier. However, he quickly loses control of the monster he created.



In this film, the Hulk was played by Edward Norton; however, in subsequent Marvel films, Mark Ruffalo replaced him to become the green giant.

Thor (2011)

Thor, the god of thunder, was banished from Asgard to Earth by his father, Odin, due to Loki's machinations. Thor must find a way to regain his power and control of his hammer.



Thor must prove he is worthy of the hammer. Fortunately, he meets a scientist on Earth who helps him put things back in place before Loki takes control of Asgard.

The Avengers (2012)

This film features all of Marvel's original superheroes. The first challenge is finding a way for them to work together.



The problems caused by Loki, the Tesseract, and the alien invasion of New York became the glue that bound the superheroes together and brought peace to Earth.

Thor: The Dark World (2013)



Thor's second solo film tells the story of his return to Asgard after the war Loki instigated in New York. However, Thor has no time to rest as the Dark Elves return. His grandfather defeated them long ago. They were once thought to be extinct but have now returned and are seeking the Aether – a weapon later revealed to be the second Infinity Stone of the Marvel universe.

Iron Man 3 (2013)



The third Iron Man film, and also Iron Man's final solo film, takes place six months after the Avengers' battle in New York. Tony Stark faces the trauma of the battle, where he nearly lost his life. These traumas drive him to build his own Iron Man army.

Captain America: The Winter Soldier (2014)

Captain America has worked for Shield, a government special agency, since the events of the Avengers. However, he increasingly questions the organization's purpose as he delves deeper into its operations. On top of that, his best friend, presumed dead, reappears on the other side of the conflict as the Winter Soldier.

This film also introduces the audience to The Falcon, played by Anthony Mackie.

Guardians Of the Galaxy (2014)

The film tells the story of Ronan, a tyrant who wants to destroy human civilization on the planet Xandar. To do so, he needs the Infinity Stones, and only the most powerful being in the universe can control them.



To thwart Ronan's plot, a team consisting of Peter Quill, Gamora, Drax, Rocket the raccoon, and Groot joined forces to protect the Xandar civilization.

Guardians of the Galaxy Vol 2 (2017)

Set just months after the Guardians defeated Ronan, Peter Quill falls in love with Gamora. Meanwhile, he is forced to uncover the mysteries of his past as he confronts an entity known as Ego.



I am Groot (2022)



This is a series containing short stories about Groot. The first episode takes place after he shrunk following the events of Guardians of the Galaxy. The rest of the series covers the period after Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 2.

Avengers: Age of Ultron (2015)

The Avengers reunite to rectify the mistakes made by Tony Stark and Bruce Banner – a destructive AI, Ultron. As long as one Ultron robot remains alive, it will continue to fight the Avengers. The film also introduces new members of the Avengers team: Scarlet Witch, Quicksilver, and Vision.



Ant-Man (2015)

Ant-Man tells the story of a man named Scott Lang, who has the ability to shrink in size but increase his strength. This forces Scott Lang to embrace his heroic side and help his mentor, Dr. Hank Pym, protect the secrets behind the Ant-Man suit and escape a terrible threat. Facing enormous obstacles, Scott Lang and Hank Pym must plan and execute a heist to save the world.

Captain America: Civil War (2016)

Although this is Captain America's solo film, it features many other superheroes. Notably, the film marks the first appearances of Black Panther and Spider-Man. The film depicts a battle between the Avengers as they split into two factions, driven by Captain America's desire to protect his friend Bucky Barnes, who is believed to be responsible for a bombing at a United Nations meeting.



Black Widow (2021)

Black Widow is set immediately after the events of Captain America: Civil War, this time the female spy must confront mysterious questions about her origins. These questions will lead Natasha back to Budapest, where she trained to become a Russian super-spy.



This film also introduces viewers to a new character who is believed to be a future member of the Avengers, Yelena.

Black Panther (2018)

Following the bombing of the United Nations in Captain America: The Civil War, T'Challa must return to his homeland of Wakanda and become king in place of his father. He must confront the country's problems as well as resolve the mistakes of his father, Eric Killmonger. He is considered one of Marvel's greatest villains.



Spiderman: Homecoming (2017)



This film will be the first time audiences have been introduced to Peter Parker – the superhero Spider-Man – in his high school years. How will an immature boy balance a normal life with the responsibilities of a hero saving the world? After the events of *Captain America: Civil War*, Peter Parker returns to his everyday life, continuing to be the shy high school student in the eyes of his friends. Meanwhile, the 15-year-old can still be a hero protecting New York thanks to the suit given to him by Tony Stark and under the remote supervision of Happy Hogan.

Doctor Strange (2016)

Stephen Strange, played by Benedict Cumberbatch, is a world-renowned surgeon. An accident causes him to lose the use of his hands. Strange then travels the world in search of a cure to regain his hand function, while also facing ancient magic.

Thor: Ragnarok (2017)

The third Thor film tells the story of Thor's journey across the universe after the death of his father, Odin. Meanwhile, his sister Hella, whose existence he was unaware of, suddenly appears, destroys his hammer, and invades Asgard. Thor also finds himself caught in a battle with gladiators on another planet. There, he meets the Hulk, who has been missing since the events of *Ultron*.



In this film, audiences will witness the combined efforts of Thor, Hulk, Loki, and Valkyrie to defeat Hella.

Ant-Man and the Wasp (2018)

Following a devastating civil war, Scott Lang – the Ant-Man hero with the ability to enlarge and shrink – faces a difficult choice in his everyday life: to be a superhero shouldering the world's heavy responsibilities or to be a responsible father. Meanwhile, Scott is summoned by Dr. Hank Pym and Hope Van Dyne – the Wasp – for a new and urgent mission. Scott will have to don the Ant-Man suit once again and fight alongside the Wasp to uncover the mysteries of the past.



Avengers: Infinity War (2018)

After years of planning to collect the Infinity Stones, Thanos decides to go in search of them himself. The only thing standing in his way is the Avengers, who are scattered throughout the universe. What can the Avengers do when Thanos attempts to wipe out half the universe's population?



Avengers: Endgame (2019)

After Thanos' snap wiped out half the universe's population, the surviving Avengers struggle to resolve the situation. Five years have passed, presenting a slim chance for them to rectify the situation and reunite as one

last Avengers team.

Loki (2021)

Fitting this series into the MCU timeline is quite challenging, as most of the events take place outside the main timeline, along with Loki's time travel and the TVA.



Therefore, placing this article after the events of Avengers: End Game is perhaps most appropriate, as this is also the event that marks the beginning of the Loki variant in this TV show.

What's If.? (2021)

This is an animated series that gives us an overview of the Multiverse after what happened in Loki. In this series, we will follow The Watcher as he explores and answers various questions.



What would happen if Agent Carter replaced Steve Rogers as Captain America? What would the future of the Marvel Universe be like if Prince T'Challa were Star-Lord instead of Peter Quill? These seemingly unrelated stories gradually connect into a major event that could impact the Marvel Cinematic Universe.

Wanda Vision (2021)

This is a TV show airing on Disney Plus that tells the story of Wanda and Vision after their battle with Thanos. Wanda is known as one of the most tragic characters in the MCU, having lost all her loved ones and being forced to kill her lover, Vision, to prevent Thanos from taking the Infinity Stones. But Thanos rewinds time and kills Vision once again right in front of her.



All of this led to Wanda in the Wanda Vision series, invading and controlling an entire town to create a better life for herself.

This is considered the event that takes place closest to Endgame. It occurs right after Wanda returns from Thanos' snap.

The Falcon and The Winter Soldier (2021)

This is a TV show that Marvel introduced on the Disney+ platform in March 2021. The main plot of this series revolves around Sam Wilson (The Falcon) and Bucky Barnes (The Winter Soldier) joining forces to fight the newly formed organization Flag Smashers, who possess a super-soldier serum similar to the one that transformed Steve Rogers into Captain America. The duo will also have to face the decision of how to use the shield that Captain America left behind.



The events in this film take place around spring 2024, before the events of Spider-Man: Far From Home.

Spiderman: Far From Home (2019)

This is the final film of Phase 3 of the Marvel Cinematic Universe. It offers a first look at the post-Endgame scenario, where half the world's population returns after five years. Peter Parker travels to Europe on a sightseeing trip and unexpectedly encounters Nick Fury and Mysterio, who need Spider-Man's help to fight the Elementals. The film's plot is believed to take place six months after Endgame – meaning in the summer of 2024.



Spider-Man: No Way Home (2021)

The film begins immediately after the previous movie ended, with Peter Parker accused of murdering Mysterio and Spider-Man's identity revealed to the world. The subsequent public backlash caused immense difficulties for Peter and those around him. Therefore, Peter sought out Doctor Strange, hoping Strange could help him resolve the situation.

The film takes place immediately after the events of Spider-Man: Far From Home, with the main events occurring around October – exactly one year after Endgame.



Shang-Chi and the Legend of the Ten Rings (2021)

This film takes place around April 2024. The plot revolves around Shang-Chi, a martial arts superhero who must confront his father, a man who is extremely harsh towards his children. Shang-Chi must do everything to prevent his father from opening the gates of evil.



She-Hulk: Attorney at Law (2022)

The film centers around lawyer Jennifer Walters, who inadvertently becomes a female version of the Hulk after coming into contact with her cousin Bruce Banner's blood in an accident. Now she must adapt to her new life – being both She Hulk and a defense lawyer for people with superpowers.



We can see the connection from Shang Chi to She Hulk when the fight scene between Abomination and Wong reappears in She Hulk. At the same time, Jenifer is tasked with defending Abomination after this incident.

Meanwhile, Jessica Gao, the show's main writer, also confirmed that this TV series takes place less than a year after Shang Chi.

Eternals (2021)

This film gives us a glimpse into the timeline of the Marvel universe. We witness the Eternals being created by the Celestials to protect humanity from the Deviants. This film is said to take place approximately 4 months to 1

year after the snap that brought back those who had disappeared 5 years earlier.



Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness (2022)

The film takes place sometime after the multiverse event in Spider-Man. Audiences will follow Doctor Strange and explore more about the multiverse through this film. At the same time, viewers will also learn about Wanda's fate after the conclusion of the Wanda Vision series through this film.



Hawkeye (2021)

This TV show is set in Christmas 2024, after the events of Avengers: Endgame, and features Yelena Belova, Natasha's younger sister, who is rumored to be replacing her sister as Black Widow in the Avengers.



Alongside Yelena is Kate Bishop, Hawkeye's apprentice. Kate Bishop comes from a wealthy family but wants to be part of the Avengers because she is inspired by Hawkeye.

Moon Knight (2022)

This is Marvel's latest TV show about Steven Grant, who suffers from dissociative identity disorder. He gradually discovers he has another life under the name Marc Spector – a professional mercenary.



Although Marvel hasn't specified the exact time period, there are clues in the film suggesting that Moon Knight takes place after Endgame.

Ms. Marvel (2022)

Ms. Marvel is a film about Kamala Khan, a Muslim American teenager who grew up in Jersey City. Kamala Khan is extremely fond of superheroes and has a vivid imagination, especially when it comes to Captain Marvel.

On the surface, Kamala Khan is no different from any other high school girl. However, she feels out of place in the classroom, and sometimes even at home. The story takes a dramatic turn when Kamala Khan receives supernatural powers, like the heroes she has always admired. Will Kamala Khan's life improve after that?

According to producer Sana Amanat, this film takes place approximately one to two years after Endgame. And according to the MCU universe timeline on the Disney Plus app, this film takes place after Moon Knight and

Hawkeye.

Thor: Love and Thunder (2022)

Thor needs to discover what he truly wants, but this is interrupted by the god-slayer Gorr. He wants to destroy all the gods, and Thor must enlist the help of Valkyrie, Korg, and Jane Foster. On their journey to stop his dark plot, they gradually uncover the secret behind Gorr's vengeful hatred and discover his true desires.



Director Taika Waititi has stated that the film takes place in 2027. Therefore, we can assume this is the most recent film to be released within the Marvel timeline.

Werewolf By Night (2022)

This is a special film that opens up the monster world of the Marvel Cinematic Universe. While the film doesn't reveal the exact timeframe of the story, the timeline released by Disney+ suggests that the events in Werewolf By Night take place after Thor: Love and Thunder.



Guardians of the Galaxy Holiday Special (2022)

According to what's posted on Disney+, the Guardians of the Galaxy Holiday Special takes place after Werewolf by Night and Thor: Love and Thunder. Through this short film, we can see the Guardians' journey on Earth during the Christmas season.

Black Panther: Wakanda Forever (2022)

Black Panther: Wakanda Forever is the latest Black Panther film produced by Marvel, and it also officially concludes Phase 4 of the Marvel Cinematic Universe.



According to Nate Moore, the film's executive producer and a Marvel Studios executive, he couldn't provide an exact timeframe for the events in the film. We only know that it definitely happens after Spider-Man: No Way Home and Eternals. Moore also suggested it might coincide with Thor: Love and Thunder, with New Asgard existing alongside what happens in Black Panther: Wakanda Forever.

Ant-Man and The Wasp: Quantumania (2023)

Ant-Man and the Wasp: Quantumania is actually quite easy to identify on the Marvel timeline, all thanks to the easter egg in Black Panther: Wakanda Forever. In Black Panther 2, news outlets mentioned Scott Lang's book, Look Out for the Little Guy.

Meanwhile, at the beginning of Ant-Man 3, he was promoting his book, meaning the two films had to be set at the same time.

Wakanda Forever is known to take place in 2025, the same year as other events such as Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness, Moon Knight, She-Hulk, Ms. Marvel, Thor: Love and Thunder, Werewolf by Night, and Guardians of the Galaxy Holiday Special. Based on the aforementioned easter egg, we can deduce that Ant-Man 3 will also take place in this year.
